Washington. Nov. 8.—Milton D. Purdy, assistant to the Attorney General, is going West within a few days in connection with the three most important proceedings now pending in the Department of Justice.

One is the Terminal case; the second is the guit against the Santa Fe for rebating, and the third has to do with the Beef Trust prosecutions in Chicago.

From St. Louis, Mr. Purdy will go to Kansas City, where both the Hutchisen Salt cases and the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company case, in each of which the Santa Fe stands accused of rebating, will come up for argument on Friday.

From Kansas City he expects to go to Chicago to consult with the local officials about the conduct of the Beef Trust presecutions.

CORPORATIONS ANSWER.

CORPORATIONS ANSWER.

The Santa Fe Company's lawyers have answered the suits by denying an offense in the Colorado Fuel and Iron case and by entering a motion to quash in the Hutchinson Salt case.

Mr. Purdy to-day was not informed which case would be argued first, but believes that, whether either or both should be considered Friday, the main law point involved in all the Government rebate cases will be decided.

The Santa Fe, with eight other Western lines was enjoined in the meat products case by Judge Phillips at Kansas city and Judge Grosscup at Chicago from granting rebates on grain, packinghouse products and "all other interstate traffic."


