A very clever arrest was made by Detective James Ward yesterday afternoon, when he took into custody John Donarano, a fourteen-year-old boy, of 11 Locust street, on suspicion. Detective Ward was looking for the person who has been taking money from the till of Vincenzo Gogato, who keeps a grocery at 205 Wallace street. Mr. Gogato has lost small amounts on several occasions and complained to the police several days ago.

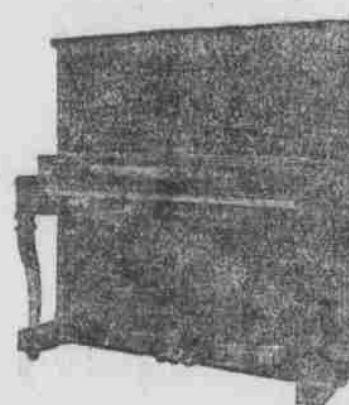
Detective Ward saw Donarano in one of the stores in the center of the city on Christmas afternoon. The boy showed considerable money and the detective became suspicious. He did not know that he had stolen from Mr. Gogato. When he saw the boy again in front of the Nicolet on Chapel street yesterday afternoon he decided to arrest him and bring him before Captain Cowles.

Captain Cowles put the boy through several degrees and finally he confessed to having robbed Mr. Gogato. The boy could not tell how much he had stolen, but said he had taken \$5 several times. He will be brought before the city court this morning.

Donarano told a hard-luck story about his parents being dead and of living, with his helpless grandmother. It was learned that he had been away from his home for two weeks, and that the authorities had been asked to look for him.
