ENLARGING THEIR FACILITIES.—The S. F. P. & P. railroad has been enjoying a constantly increasing traffic. For some time the need of a larger baggage room at the Phoenix depot has been apparent and in order to be fully prepared for the carnival rush this accommodation has been provided. CHAPLAIN SCOTT'S PATRIOTISM.—The following clipping from the Prescott Journal-Miner will be read with interest in Phoenix and needs no comment: "Chaplain Scott made application recently to the war department to be transferred from the retired list of army chaplains to the active list, and requested an assignment for duty in the Philippines, but the department denied the request. His action was quite in contrast with those chaplains who objected to service in the Philippines."

THE RIVERSIDE COUNTRY.—Thomas Gray returned yesterday from a prospecting trip in the Riverside district along Pinto creek and other regions of Pinal and Gila counties. Mr. Gray believes that is the most immediately promising mining country in Arizona. A great smelter is being erected at Riverside, and mining promoters are threatening to gridiron the country with railroads, and some of them will no doubt be built, for the mining operations have every appearance of being of a permanent character. Mr. Gray says that Joseph Mulhatten's mining exchange at Florence is partly responsible for the activity in the Riverside country. A great deal of capital has been attracted by Mr. Mulhatten's nervous restlessness, and it is said that he started the mining exchange in the first place just to be doing something to relieve himself of ennui. Thus from a mere recreation it has been transformed into a thriving business.

ROUGH RIDER BASE BALL TEAM.—The Rough Rider base ball team, which is composed of unpretentious rural athletes, has been dodging round the valley very promiscuously of late, much in the manner of the famous regiment whose name they have appropriated, and incidentally have been causing no little comment by their notable victories on the diamond. Thursday they swooped down on Glendale like a whirlwind and silenced the village team by a score of 17 to 9. 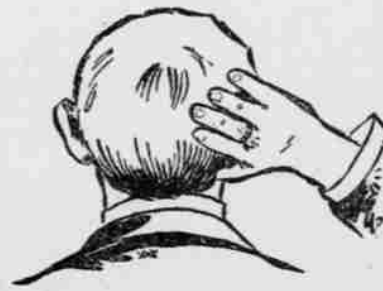
