day of two robberies. The first occurred at the house of a man named Fuller, living near Glendale. He lost \$23. The money, consisting of ten \$20 gold pieces, one \$10 piece and two fives, was concealed under a rug. The house was broken open, probably about 9 o'clock, on Monday night. No tracks were found about the house and there is no other clue. The other robbery was committed yesterday afternoon at the home of a Mr. Holmes, living two miles west of Mesa. A suit of black clothes, a pair of light shoes and other articles were stolen.

A POSSIBLE WINNER.—For some time past the Los Angeles Times has been publishing coupons which subscribers were invited to fill out, making guesses on the census return of the population of Los Angeles. Among others responding was A. P. Walbridge of Phoenix, whose guess was 102,516. Monday night's dispatches announced that the official figures were 102,479, just 37 less than Mr. Walbridge's estimate. The first prize offered by the Times is a \$600 piano and if Mr. Walbridge is seen with such an instrument under his arm people may know where he got it.

POLITICS IN TEMPE.—The democratic campaign was opened last night by a big meeting in Tempe, C. C. Woolf of Kyrene called the meeting to order and introduced the chairman of the county central committee, Vernon L. Clark, who, after a few remarks, presented George Purdy Bullard, candidate for district attorney. Mr. Bullard was followed by J. H. Langston Jr., candidate for probate judge, and Mack Smith, who was alleged to be the nominee of the democratic party for delegate to congress, concluded the programme with one of his typical speeches which converts everybody—for a few minutes.

A RICH SUSPECT.—Early yesterday morning word was brought to Marshal Hooker that a man who was probably one of the Mesa postoffice robbers was sleeping in the grand stand at the old fair grounds. The marshal and Officer Hale went down and found him. He was very cool when he was awakened. He said he was sleeping there because he was broke and had no money to pay for a bed. He was searched and his pockets were found to contain much hidden wealth: \$687 in cash and a check for \$25 on the Valley bank. The check was three months old. The prisoner was recognized yesterday as an old customer who had sold out his stock to beat the tax gatherer some months ago.

THE STATE OF KENTUCKY.—Mr. L. T. Mansfield has lately returned from an eastern visit of a month. He spent a part of this time in Michigan and a part at his old home in Kentucky, where his mother still resides. There is little thought of and nothing talked about in Kentucky but politics. Democrats say there will be no doubt of the election of Beckham for governor, and republicans and gold democrats say that Yerkes will be elected by such an overwhelming majority that he cannot be counted out. The democrats are directing their efforts principally in behalf of Beckham, and consequently are neglecting the national fight. Mr. Mansfield was asked what in his opinion would be the result. He said he thought it was an even break between Beckham and Yerkes, but that McKinley would probably carry the state.

A SURVEYING CONTRACT.—Mr. W. T. Smith returned yesterday morning from the Grand Canyon reservation, where he is interested with J. C. Dubbins, the civil engineer, in a government surveying contract. Rapid progress is being made, notwithstanding the rough character of the country. They have taken an additional contract for surveying the Supai reservation. Both contracts will be finished by November 15. Mr. Smith said that the lately reported loss of their instruments had no other foundation than the running away of a horse on which a tripod was fastened. There was another tripod in the outfit so that the work was not interrupted. The horse turned up at Williams with his burden unharmed. Mr. Smith was asked what he thought of the Mark Smith and J. F. Wilson contest in the north. "There isn't any," said Mr. Smith. "I didn't hear anything about Mark Smith at all. There is a hard fight between Wilson and Murphy."

RAILROAD EXPANSION.—A Graham county gentleman who was in the city yesterday says that republican ideas and principles are rapidly gaining ground in that county. Expansion is becoming popular, so much so in fact that the Arizona and New Mexico narrow gauge railroad will soon be broadened to standard gauge, to keep up with the march of progress and incidentally to further facilitate the development of the rich natural resources of the county. Politically, republicans have good cause for congratulation. Governor Murphy has a host of good friends in that county who will lend him all possible assistance in his campaign and the county ticket is hopeful of victory owing to democratic dissensions, similar to, but different, from the split in this county. There is an open disaffection in the party ranks regarding the candidate for district attorney and the county convention turned down the present sheriff, who asked for a re-nomination and was clearly entitled to it. While he may be personally supporting the ticket he doubtless has friends who are just as prone to get sore as human beings are in any other county when they are abused.


