mother, Mrs. Weaver of Prescott.

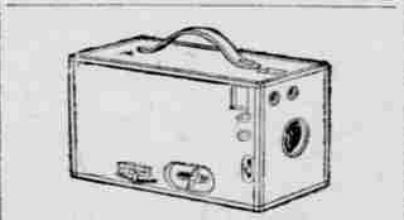
NEW MUSIC.—The new hymn and

THE HEADGATE BREAKING
CASES.—The case of Gabriel Suckley,
charged with breaking a headgate of the
Arizona Water company, set for
trial in Justice Barnett's court yester-
day, was dismissed on the motion of
the district attorney and a new com-
plaint was made against the defend-
ant. The first charge was not de-
fective, but the time at which the par-
ticular offense charged had occurred
could not be definitely sworn to by
the witnesses for the territory. An-
other headgate breaking incident was,
therefore, substituted. The trial of
the other similar cases against var-
ious other defendants will begin on
November 20, and will be continued
until all have been disposed of.

PHOENIX CARRIER PIGEONS.—A
young son of Mr. Thomas Armstrong,
Jr., is interested in carrier pigeons and
has several expensive and well bred
birds. They are young and had never
been given any sort of a trial until the
day before yesterday. Master Arm-
strong wanted him to take a couple of
birds with him to the Gold Coin mine
and let them try to find their way back.
It is twenty miles to the mine by
wagon road and about ten in a direct
line. The birds, laden with messages,
were turned loose on the top of a
mountain. They rose up, circling until
they were mere specks against the sky.
Then they set off on a bee line to Phoe-
nix and in a few minutes they were on
their familiar roost.

HARVARD SOCIETY.—A number of
former students of Harvard college
met last evening at the office of Dr.
Foss and made a temporary organiza-
tion of the Harvard society. Dr. Foss
was chosen for chairman and Frederick
S. Webb for secretary. It developed
that there was even more interest in
the movement than had been antici-
pated, and it has also transpired that
there are more Harvard men in this
part of the country than was supposed.
One gentleman was present from Flag-
staff. It was learned that a number
of eligible men in the valley could not
be present in the evening, so it was
decided to hold another meeting at the
same place, Friday afternoon, at 3
o'clock. It is desired that all who can
attend the meeting and that those who
are eligible but cannot attend will at
least send in their names. The object
of the society is to effect a closer re-
lationship between former students and
to furnish such Harvard men in the
east as desire it information regarding
Arizona and opportunities here for
