Notwithstanding the unusual cold weather, it is reported the orange trees are unharmed.

A protest was filed last Friday with the town clerk against the council further participating in any form of construction company, and demanding that legal proceedings be instituted to recover damages incurred by taxpayers by forfeiture of said pretended contract; to follow the principles of municipal ownership of public utilities in the erection of water works, and to use resident laborers in preference to foreign hands. The following is a copy of the Sturtevant contract in controversy:

This memorandum of agreement made this 25th day of April, 1900, by and between the common council of Tempe, acting for and in behalf of said town of Tempe, party of the first part, and the Phoenix Construction company of Chicago, party of the second part, witnesses:

That whereas the second party did on the 20th day of October, 1899, enter into a contract with the first party for the construction of a water works plant for the said town under and in accordance with certain plans and specifications agreed upon and adopted by both parties hereto, and said second party immediately thereafter entered upon the said work of construction of said plant under such contract; and, whereas, under said contract it was agreed that the full consideration for such work should be in certain bonds of the said town of Tempe, taken at par by the said second party to the full amount of the contract price set forth in said contract; and, whereas, the legality of the bonds which the said town of Tempe had caused or were about to have issued for the purpose of paying for the said work have been questioned and cannot be made available in the carrying out of the said contract; now, therefore,

It is mutually agreed that the said contract shall remain binding and in full force between the parties hereto in all respects except as to the element of time, and that the time shall be extended for the performance and completion of said work until the said bonds can be put in good legal form, either by a new election under a school census or by some satisfactory amendment of the laws authorizing the issuance of the said bonds, and that owing to the lateness of the season the second party shall not be required to undertake the said work of construction before September 15, 1900.

ABOUT TITLED PEOPLE.

The birth of a son to Prince and Princess Albert of Belgium gave the greater satisfaction to King Leopold's subjects because recent disappointments in Russia and Italy had made some people fear that the Belgian succession might also be left in an undecided condition by the arrival of a princess instead of a prince. In Holland and in Spain, where expectations still prevail, girl babies have their welcome in the royal family, for they can beget in deficit of male heirs. Prince Albert of Belgium, like her equally fortunate sister, Princess Rupprecht of Bavaria, also the mother of a valuable boy, is the granddaughter of Oom Miguel, once pretender to the throne of Portugal, who married rather late in life, after his penitential adventures were over, and left an interesting family of one son and six daughters.

Some of his descendants promise to hold very high places among European royalties—two babies who may become kings being among the number. That which disappointed first families long in one way they occasionally gain in another, through fortunate marriages. Through the Comtesse de Paris will hardly see her eldest son, the Duc d'Orleans, become king of France, yet her eldest daughter is queen of Portugal and mother of the heir of a throne. Another daughter is duchess of Aosta, holding a high position in Italy. Very unlikely is it that the count of Caserta will be hailed as king of Naples, though his daughter is queen of Romania, but his children are making great matches, and one of his sons is the husband of the princess of Asturias.
