SNOW IN PRESCOTT.—Word was received from Prescott yesterday that it was snowing there, and it is to be hoped that it is still at it.

AN INDIANA PARTY.—Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Van Natta and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. O. Barnard and George O. Barnard formed a party that arrived here yesterday morning from Fowler, Ind.

MEETING OF HORSEMEN.—Another meeting of the members of the Arizona Fair and Racing association will be held at the Hotel Adams this evening, beginning at 7:30. It is desired that there be a full attendance, as it is hoped that the organization may be made complete at this meeting.

TUCSON'S PROSPECTS.—Things seem to be pretty lively in Tucson and the people are full of boom stuff regarding municipal improvements and business expansion. The latest proposed improvement is a brand new cemetery. Times there are no good the old one seems to be unable to handle all the business, and Tucson is afraid some of it will go by to Phoenix.

ARIZONA SHIPPING INDUSTRY.—The St. Valliers, the new steamer recently purchased by the Mexican-Colombia Navigation company, with Capt. Alphonse B. Smith aboard, arrived in Yuma Thursday from Needles. The St. Valliers is the handsomest boat on the river.

It will be somewhat remodelled in Yuma before being put into regular service by the company.

SUPREME COURT.—The territorial supreme court, which convened a week ago and immediately adjourned until today, will reconvene this morning and then adjourn without the transaction of any business to Monday, January 27. It was expected that Chief Justice Street would return the latter part of last week. Judge Davis is still detained by illness in his family.

SOLD AT AUCTION.—Coffee At wandered around the streets Saturday looking at the big crowds in town and seeking the greatest center of excitement. He found it on a corner where an auction sale was going on. While he was watching in the crowd someone planned to his suit a "for sale" sign.

He stood around for some time before he realized that he was attracting more attention than the auctioneer and eventually he discovered that he was "sold." He has been sold a great many times in his life, as everyone else has, but this is the first time he was ever disposed of at an auction.

SURFICIAL MANTA.—Frank Statat was brought down from Prescott and placed in the asylum, after an attempt

at suicide, that came near proving successful. He was serving a 60-day term in the Prescott jail. Thursday night he was acting queerly and was placed in a cell by himself. He grew more violent and was placed in a straight-jacket till Friday morning, when he got hold of a razor, supposed to have been hidden in his bedding, and slashed it across his throat. He narrowly missed the jugular vein and partly cut his windpipe before he could be overpowered. After his wounds were dressed he begged to be shot, but by night was considered able to travel, and was brought to Phoenix.

DEATH OF FRED CARDER.—Mr. Fred A. Carder died last night about 11 o'clock at the residence of W. L. Osborn, No. 1257 East Lincoln street, of consumption. Mr. Carder was well known in Phoenix as a young man of exemplary habits and upright character. He was born in Providence, R. I., August 21, 1874, and when about three years old removed with his parents to Chicago. His health failing him to some extent, he came to Phoenix about six years ago and was employed in various Phoenix business houses. December 24, 1908, he married Miss Gertrude Osborn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Osborn of this city. Mr. Carder went to California last spring and returned to Phoenix about three weeks ago, a babe having blessed the union about a month preceding. Mr. Carder also leaves a father, mother and brother in Chicago. The funeral will be held this afternoon at the residence.

IT HAS RAINED.—It rained yesterday, but just enough to let Henry Morgan escape by the skin of his teeth, with an unimpaired reputation as a weather prophet. If it rains more, as it certainly ought to do, Mr. Morgan's predictions will have an added value, but if it does not, he has staked the present test and will be given another chance. The wind got up a lively motion yesterday, and a little after noon it was blowing about as hard as the wind is allowed to blow, and the dust stirred up made quite a spectacle and soon that, too, was a good indication for Arizona rains are very apt to be preceded by sand storms. A Republican reporter called at the weather bureau office yesterday, to see if the government is likely to furnish any rain in the immediate future, but George Burns was reluctant and very guarded in his statements. He promised no certain relief, but agreed to do the best he could, and said any movement to secure rain would have his moral support, intimating that if a good rain got started he would see his chance with the rain-gauge to make the best possible showing. He would not desire it or take unfair advantage of it, but he would see that none of the rain got away without being counted. Last year was a pretty fair one for the valley and the crops were reasonably good, though the rainfall was far below the average, being but a little over four inches. He admitted having a sort of a "hunch" that a good big storm is pulling itself together, but he did not base it on any official information from headquarters.

AN INCENDIARY ATTEMPT

An Effort to Burn Smith's Mill on Saturday Night.

Some time on Saturday night an attempt was made to burn DeMund's mill. It was discovered early Sunday morning by Driver O'Graham, who sleeps in the mill. He had arisen before daylight and some about his duties. He smelled smoke on the east side of the mill, which seemed to come from under the platform. He investigated and found a box that had contained canned fruit. It had been filled with shavings, chips and an old gummy sack or two and the contents had been saturated with coal oil. A slow match seemed to have been used in firing the contents of the box. They were charred, but on account of the absence of air were not ignited. "Set off" had been thrown over the platform above the box and been dashed under the nearest door of the mill.

Mr. O'Graham remembered that some time in the night he heard a buggy driven up to the mill and heard it stop. He thought he heard somebody walk on the platform. He found tracks made by a rubber tired buggy and followed them for some distance to a place where the buggy had been stopped. The driver evidently having stopped to await the result of the fire he had started. Soon after that the tracks were lost in the maze of tracks in that vicinity. There is no suspicion as to the identity of the intending incendiary. The work had not been done in a very scientific manner.
