WERE ARIZONIANS FIRST.

The most complete story of the signing of the joint statehood bill is that presented by the New York Times, which purports to give the language used by the president on that occasion; his expressed belief that Arizona would declare for joint statehood and his determination to use his influence to secure such a declaration.

It has been denied on the other hand, that the president actually said what has been attributed to him, but it is asserted that the words were put into his mouth by Senator Beveridge in interviews with various Washington correspondents to whom he described the signatory ceremony.

In spite of the corroborative character of the stories of that event, we trust that it is true that the president will seek no further to point out to the voters of this territory their duty which they understand much more clearly than the president could possibly understand it.

In the course of the statehood campaign, properly beginning with the publication of the president's message to congress, The Republican has felt compelled to criticize systematically the course which the president was pursuing systematically. Its criticisms were not of President Roosevelt, for whose high ideals and great performances in the past it entertained a genuine admiration. The criticisms were directed against the victim of Beveridge's misrepresentations and who seemed to be bent upon doing Arizona a mortal injury.

The Republican regretted that it had been forced to assume this attitude toward the administration, and it would more deeply regret the necessity for the continuance of it during the period which will elapse on November 6.

But we trust there will be no such necessity; that the president, in signing the joint statehood bill fully accepted the spirit of the Carter compromise, which intended that the people of Arizona should be allowed free and untrammelled expression.

It has been stated that an effort is to be made to induce the National Republican committee to interest itself in the statehood campaign in this territory. Perhaps such an appeal will be made, but there are many reasons for supposing that the committee would peremptorily reject it. The chief one is that in no event could the national party be benefited in participating in what is not and cannot be made a party issue.

On the republicanism of The Republican, in city, county and territorial and national politics there has never been a stain. This paper is interested in the prevalence of republican principles because it believes them to be the best for the country at large. But whatever allegiance this paper owes to its party, it owes a higher one to the territory. However strong the republicanism of The Republican may be, its Arizonaism is stronger and it will oppose any policy by whomsoever advocated, which seems to be aimed against the prosperity of the territory. Nothing more deadly to the interests of Arizona was ever conceived than the policy of joint statehood.

We believe furthermore, that in defining the stand of The Republican, we define the unshakable position of an overwhelming majority of the republicans of this territory.

With all the Thaw and Carnegie millions behind him, young Harry K. Thaw ought to be able to prove himself a degenerate and a victim of emotional insanity.

We hope that the plan of the citizens' committee, or any plan for removing the dust problem will not be found impracticable. We are certain that no plan, however wild or wise, can be more impracticable than that of maintaining a city in the manner in which it has been done since June 1. Every time we look upon the driving dust we

think of the way that Kansas hotel was kept. It is more and more essential that the present city charter be thrown away. If we cannot get a better one, well and good. The one we have now is worse than worthless.

Carrie Nation has been vindicated. She was a pioneer, and with her little hatchet blazed the way which the state authorities followed yesterday at Kansas City, Kas.

There is an apparent concert between the two houses of congress to avoid the enactment of any meat inspection law at this session of congress. The position of the senate requiring the packers to pay the cost of inspection is one that could easily be abandoned since the packers would not in the end pay it anyway. The position of the house against the dated label is without any sort of defense. Well, if the packers can get along without inspection legislation, the people can.

There is at least one paper in New Mexico, The Outlook, of White Oaks, which wants none of joint statehood and which appeals to the voter of this territory "to save us from Mexican domination." Says the Outlook: "It makes but little difference how much of a New Mexico crowd clambers into the 'State of Arizona' band wagon here in the territory, they will probably be most unceremoniously kicked out by the level-headed people of the territory of Arizona on election day next November."

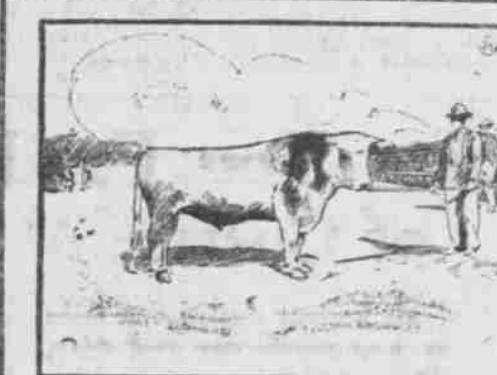
