ARIZONA AS A LIFE PRESERVER.

Arizona and New Mexico, says ex-
Delegate Rodey, according to the Al-
buquerque Citizen, "are in the same
position that two persons would be if
they were tied together and thrown
overboard half a mile from the shore.
Each has the very highest right to
spurn the other along, make him swim
and not give up, so as to drown both.
Unless both swim, neither can reach
the shore, statehood, and both will
drown, remain out indefinitely."

That is a very ingenious figure but
it is not properly applied. Both ter-
ritories are overboard and the water
is deep, but they are not tied together
yet, and God willing, they never will
be. New Mexico is floundering badly
but Arizona has demonstrated her
ability to swim alone in any kind of
weather. Once at anchor she will be
glad to throw a separate statehood
line to her struggling companion, but
she is not enough of a heroine just
now to attempt the rescue of her help-
less lover and take a chance on both
going to the bottom.

SOMETHING LIKE IT.

There can be no better motto than:
"New Mexicans for New Mexico and
New Mexico for New Mexicans." Should
all adopt this motto the distance
between them would be lessened, and
that which we are now experiencing,
great as the latter certainly is,—Albu-
querque Citizen.

That's exactly the right sort of stuff.
That is the sentiment Arizona has
been trying to hammer into the New
Mexicans all the time—New Mexico
for the New Mexicans and Arizona for
the Arizonians.

The public will be curious to know
what President Palma expects the
Cuban congress to do in special session.
It is presumed that the president al-
ready has full authority to whip the
rebels if he can, and it has been an-
nounced that he is not worried in a
financial way, having plenty of funds
available for months to come. Per-
haps he wants congress to authorize
him to surrender to the rebels. If that
is the kind of material the congress is
made of, the sooner the government
surrenders the better. The American
motto is to stand by the government,
and, if it is wrong, whip the rebels
first and then right it. Mr. Palma is
not setting a very good American ex-
ample. On the other hand, if the
Cuban elections were fraudulent, as
Guerra claims, and his cause is just, were
he a good American he should have
been able to rectify matters at the polls
a little later, without appealing to
arms. Both sides of the controversy
seem to be repulsive to the average
American, whose sympathy is with
Palma in his desire to establish a
peaceful government, and whose re-
spect is for Guerra, who seems to be
a pretty good fighting man and some-
thing of an organizer.

Our boyhood friend, M. H. Thomp-
son, of Luna valley, New Mexico, re-
marks: "Both Arizona and New Mex-
ico should be states, and I believe that
the attempt to join them is purely an
attempt to prevent the west from get-
ting any more national influence. The
only thing I can see in the hope of us
of New Mexico, is the hope of a bet-
ter school system, for in Arizona you
have an excellent system and we just
have none." There is no set of people
in all America who will do more to
help New Mexican education in any
possible way, provided it does not pull
ours down, but we think that is just
what jointure would do for us and our
schools. Let it build up its own sys-
tem.—Plain Talk (St. Johns, Ariz.).

E. M. Dickerman, who will be the
republican candidate for joint council-
man in Pima and Santa Cruz coun-
ties, will be elected this year without a
doubt. He ran two years ago and
tied with the democratic candidate. A
democratic legislature seated his op-
ponent. Mr. Dickerman says he only
needed one more vote in the last cam-
paign and this year he has secured the
pledge of a newcomer from Ohio, so
he has a clinch.

NOTHING TO IT.

The following is a fair sample of the
statehood arguments of the Santa Fe
New Mexican:

"Arizona's opposition to statehood is
the stranger because Arizona gets by
far the greater portion of the imme-
diate benefits conferred by the enabling
act. Although New Mexico has from
50 to 60 per cent more population than
Arizona, the latter is made a congres-
sional district the same as this terri-
tory, by the Hamilton statehood act.
The same enactment also creates a
judicial district of the present Arizona,
giving it a judge, a United States at-
torney and a United States marshal,
the same as New Mexico, which has a
much larger population."

It seems proper to enquire what there
is in the above list that Arizona hasn't
got already, except the difference be-
tween a delegate and a congressman,
and that is not temptation enough to
lead this territory into ambush this
year, for it will be only a short time
until Arizona has separate statehood
and a congressman without strings on
him.

Possibly Bull Andrews is so busy
seeking a renomination just now that
he hasn't time to write letters, but he
is reminded that his correspondence
with the Arizona Rough Riders is be-
ing neglected.

A Hillsboro dispatch says that Dele-
gate William H. Andrews has sold his
entire herd of cattle and a number of
his horses to Joseph Richardson and
Henry Ogdenorth. It is also reported
that United States Attorney W. H. H.
Llewellyn has purchased the remain-
der of the horses and the residence of
Mr. Andrews—Santa Fe New Mexi-
can.

Globe, whose population now num-
bers many thousands, is finally mak-
ing a move for incorporation and will
hold a mass meeting tomorrow to con-
sider the subject. It is something con-
cerning which Globe perhaps needs no
outside advice, but it is hard to con-
ceive how there can be any objection
to incorporation in a town of the size
and importance of Globe.

A FILIPINO THIEF

Patron Saint of the Latest Move for
an Island Republic.

Manila, Sept. 9.—Dominar Gomez,
at a political rally yesterday, declared
that England, France and Germany
would recognize a Filipino republic.
Gomez made the above declaration in
response to a request for an accounting
of money collected. He further said
that the money had been spent in send-
ing cablegrams to Europe, to create a
sentiment in favor of a Filipino repub-
lic, and that favorable replies had
been received. Gomez late Thursday
was released from jail on bail. He was
arrested on a charge of having slan-
dered Governor Callies.

BAD DREAM KILLS WOMAN.

Expires of Fright at Vision of Negro
About to Kill Her.

Columbus, O., Sept. 9.—Becoming
hysterical over a dream that a negro
was standing over her bed with a
knife to kill her, Miss Annie Morgan,
aged 37, ran from her room last night,
crying out her fears and sank to the
floor overcome, dying in a few min-
utes of heart trouble.

Jones, one of the few surviving veter-

home here tonight, aged 89 years.

cohol or any of the alleged harmful drugs.
These facts were also proven in the trial of
the action in the Supreme Court. But the
publication of the libelous article with
its great display headings, while hundreds of

article never saw the humble groveling re-
traction, set in small type and made as incon-
spicuous as possible. The matter was, how-
ever brought before a jury in the Supreme
Court of New York State which promptly
rendered a verdict in the doctor's favor.

base slanders were refuted.
