THE ELECTION EXPENSES HOW THEY MAY BE PAID

Governor Kibbey Suggests to Boards of Supervisors a Plan of Procedure.

Governor Kibbey has sent out a letter to the various boards of supervisors in reference to the payment of the expenses of the late general election. He states that some time ago in compliance with a request from the department he forwarded an estimate of the expenses to be incurred, the object being to arrange for the payment of the expenses out of the \$150,000 appropriated by the statehood bill for holding the election of delegates to the constitutional convention.

Though this money has been appropriated and is now available, there has been no determination of the manner in which it is to be disbursed. It will probably be turned over to the department of the interior by the treasury department and be paid out by the former on the presentation of the claims for election expenses.

The governor is not sure that all the expenses incident to the holding of the election will be borne by the government, though he does not see how they are to be separated. The holding of the constitutional election for the payment of the expenses of which the statehood bill provides would have cost no less than if it had not been combined with the general election except that the general election was preceded by a proclamation which was not contemplated by the bill.

The governor points out that the government pays no claim without a great deal of formality and generally payment is made after considerable delay. He suggests therefore that the chances of the delay be not increased by a carelessness in making out claims for expenses. All claims should be carefully itemized and verified in order that the department will not have to make inquiry for further explanation. The claims should be in duplicate, one copy to be retained by the territorial secretary and the other to be forwarded to the department.

At 9 o'clock tomorrow night a grand ball will be tendered the visiting Masons at the Hotel Adams by the local lodges of the order. GOOD WORD COMES TO BEET GROWERS

The Outstanding Indebtedness of the Sugar Company to Be Taken Up and Arrangements Made for Next Year.

Lafayette Myers, general manager of the Eastern Sugar Company yesterday received a telegram which contained very good and welcome news to the ranchers of this valley. It said that the finances of the company be represented had been again adjusted and that at a very early date funds would be arranged for and as soon as the crop of last year is paid for the signing of contracts for the coming year will be taken up. Although the news received came in a telegram it was stated that a letter outlining details had been mailed, and it was the opinion of Mr. Myers that he would be able to announce the details of his plans by the last of the week. He would not make a statement as to from what source the funds to finance the property had come further than to say that the arrangements had been consummated by Mr. Murphy.

About the first of September John B. McKinnis, a very wealthy resident of Colorado Springs, paid a visit to Phoenix and at that time it was rumored that he had taken over the property of the Eastern Sugar Company. Mr. McKinnis is at present engaged in the manufacture of beet sugar and was the builder of the first factory in Colorado.

While nothing of a positive nature is known it is generally surmised that it is from a combination of capitalists headed by Mr. McKinnis that the present funds are forth coming.

GLOBE AND SUPERIOR.

News From the Old Silver Queen and Globe Consolidated.

Fine ore has been found in the old shaft of the Queen Mining company's property, which adjoins the Lake Superior & Arizona mine at Superior, says the Silver Belt. The old shaft of what was once intended for a silver mine has been reopened to the 400-foot level and ore has been found on the 300 and 400 levels.

On the 200 there is over three feet of ore that assays five ounces silver and 10 1/2 per cent copper, and eighteen inches of ore that assays 40 per cent copper. On the 400 there is four feet of green carbonate ore that assays 24 per cent copper. At the surface an open cut has disclosed a large body of ore that averages 14 1/2 per cent copper.

Supt. J. W. Bandhauer leaves for the mine this morning and will at once complete arrangements for the shipment of ore to the American Smelting company at Humboldt, Arizona. Two cars will be sent out this month and shipments will probably be doubled in December.

The mine is owned in Globe and the president of the company W. D. Fiske, returned from New York last evening, where he made a payment for the property.

Yesterday the new ten drill compressor of the Globe Consolidated was started at the shaft on the Gem claim, and this morning the drills will be put in commission and the work of sinking which has progressed so rapidly during the past two months, will be further expedited. The shaft is now in a conglomerate quartzite, which is very soft and shows that the shaft is running in close proximity with the vein. Sinking is very rapid in this formation.
