Nows From the Old Silver Queen and Globe Consolidated.

Fine ore has been found in the old shaft of the Queen Mining company's property, which adjoins the Lake Superior & Arizona mine at Superior. says the Silver Belt. The old shaft of what was once intended for a silver mine has been reopened to the 400-foot level and ore has been found on the 300 and 400 jevels.

On the 200 there is over three feet of ore that assays five ounces silver and 10.3 per cent copper, and eighteen inches of ore that goes 40 per cent copper. On the 400 there is four feet of green carbonate ore that assays 24 per cent copper. At the surface an open cut has disclosed a farge body of ore that averages 16.7 per cent copper.
