THE DAY IN COURT.

The business of the law day session of the district court was largely confined to divorce matters. Nellie Payne was granted a divorce from her husband, James Payne. In the case of Nellie McDowell against Leo McDowell a motion and demurrer were continued until March 27. The case of W. B. Kibbey against S. P. Johnstone and others, an attachment proceeding, was dismissed on the motion of the plaintiff at his cost.

NEW LITIGATION.

A suit was filed in district court yesterday by M. W. Kales against Laetitia M.D. Lewis, R. Allen Lewis and Fred Herrera, receiver for the International Bank of Nogales. The suit is brought to foreclose a mortgage on certain property in Phoenix and to secure the payment of a note for \$7,700 given by Lewis and his wife in 1902. Herrera as receiver of the defendant bank with which Lewis was connected has established some sort of claim on this property. Suit was begun by Harrison Albright, the architect of the Noble building, against John Noble, Hugo Richards and other lien holders in the Noble middle, asking that all other liens be declared inoperative to his. Albright's claim is \$7,500.

TO FLORENCE TODAY.

A train load of people will invade Florence by the Gila today, the train leaving Phoenix at 9:30 o'clock city time. Accompanying the excursionists will be the Industrial Liberty Band to dispense sweet melodies, and the Woodchoppers' ball team to furnish the sport. The Florence Board of Trade has arranged to furnish free transportation round trip across the Gila to Florence to the visitors. As the hotel and restaurant capacity may be taxed by the invading hosts it is suggested as a wise idea to take along a lunch. "Cuber" of Mesa, will pitch for the Florence team, while Grjalva will toss for the Choppers. The line-up will include Magoffin, Towers, Vinson, Olney, Sullivan, Lewis and Richardson. Gormely will be taken along to umpire. A rattling good game is looked for. There will be many other diversions in store for the Phoenixians who make the trip. Quite a number will join the train on the southside.

FAVORABLY RECOMMENDED.

In accordance with customary usage, the congressional committee to which they were referred, passed along to the interior department, and that department to the governor, the various bills introduced in this session relating to municipalities or counties wishing to bond themselves for any purpose, with a request for a report upon the facts and recommendations concerning their passage. Recently five such bills were received by Governor Kibbey and his report was desired promptly, when he left for the south he directed his secretary, Mr. Ely, to make the report which was completed and forwarded yesterday, in each instance setting forth their reasons for the measures and recommending their passage. One of the bills is the Phoenix \$150,000 bonding bill, to provide funds for redeeming the old warrants. The other four are county bonding bills. Gila county requires \$25,000 more to complete her fine new court house; Apache county wants \$15,000 to build a new court house in place of the present small quarters; Mohave wants \$25,000 and Yuma county \$75,000, in each case for a new court house and jail in place of the present old and inconvenient adobe structures.

PYTHIANS HONORED AND APPRECIATIVE

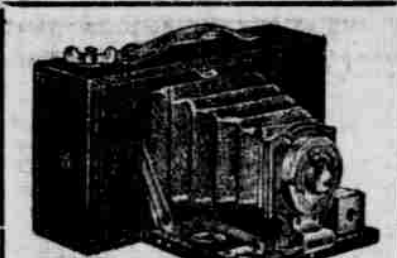
Representatives From All Over the Domain Gather to Greet Supreme Chancellor Barnes.

Judge and Mrs. Charles A. Barnes of Jacksonville, Ill., the former being the supreme chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, arrived here yesterday morning via the Santa Fe, from southern California, for an official visit to the domain of Arizona. The trip was rather a hurried one in the beginning and it was impossible for Mr. and Mrs. Barnes to devote more than one day to Arizona, so it had been previously arranged for a representative gathering of as many of the Arizona knights as possible in Phoenix, to meet them. They had intended also to stop a day in New Mexico and another in Oklahoma, but yesterday received word of the serious illness of their little son, so they canceled these two engagements, and left on the Diamond Joe train this morning for home.

Fourteen of the twenty-three lodges in the jurisdiction had representatives here yesterday to meet the distinguished visitors and among them were the following members of the territorial grand lodge: Hiram P. Merrill of Jerome, grand vice-chancellor; E. H. Olson of Globe, grand master at arms; J. D. Loper of Mesa City, grand keeper of records and seal; Dr. L. A. W. Burch of Clifton, grand inside guard; Webster Street of Phoenix, past supreme representative; J. M. Aitken of Prescott, supreme representative; A. J. Matthews of Tempe, grand trustee.

The visitors were met at the depot yesterday morning by a joint committee of theologians in this valley and the Pythian Sisters and escorted to the Ford hotel where breakfast was served. After a short rest Judge J. H. Langston of Phoenix, the grand chancellor, and Mrs. Ida Moore, grand chief of the Pythian Sisters accompanied Judge and Mrs. Barnes on an automobile trip east as far as Clayton's ranch, north to the Arizona canal, west to Center street, and south through the Indian school grounds and back to Phoenix, and a number of local city show places, including the capitol grounds. In the afternoon Messrs. C. A. Staffer, A. J. Matthews and J. D. Loper accompanied Judge Barnes on another automobile ride through the west end of the valley.

Last evening there was a district meeting of the lodge presided over by Supreme Chancellor Barnes who made a short talk to the members and exemplified the secret work. While this was going on Messrs. 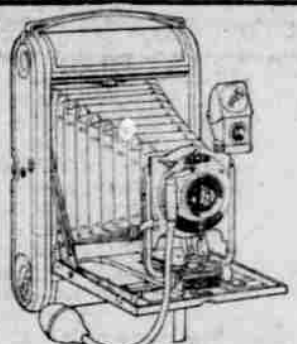

THE SPRING RIDE TO CASTLE HOT SPRINGS

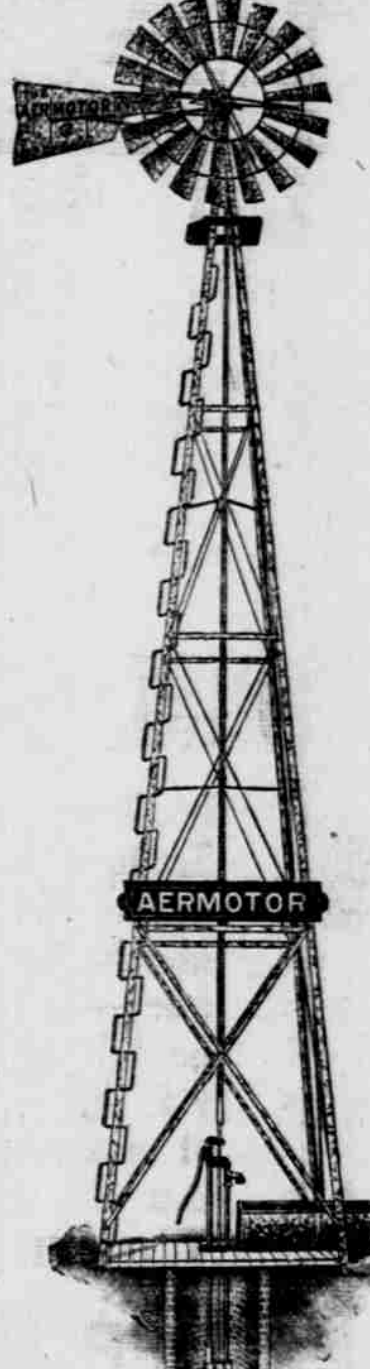
Of All the Seasons It is the Most Delightful For an Overland Trip.
