## TEMPE

### THE MOSQUITO PEST.

Further Action Taken by City Council  
For Their Extermination.

The city council held a special meeting Friday evening in the council chamber, the principal business of which was the further consideration of a matter that was brought up some weeks ago though at that time no definite action was taken. Reference is made to the subject of mosquitoes, which it will be remembered was brought up by Mayor Dines and others some time back. At the Friday evening meeting a move was made in the nature of an experiment. If it proves a success, it will be of great benefit to the town and the peaceful slumbers of Tempe citizens will no longer be disturbed by the buzz of the busy mosquito. Tempe will then have another drawing card, added to its many that it now has, for it will be able to boast that mosquitoes are unknown here.

The subject was given a pretty thorough discussion at the meeting and several plans were brought up bearing on the matter. It has been decided that by way of experiment a liberal application of coal oil will be made to all cess pools and closets some day in the near future to see what effect it

will have on the pests. With that end in view the city marshal has been instructed to purchase ten cases of coal oil and three barrels of crude oil and secure the necessary help to handle it; then on some day that will be announced later, he with his assistants will make a canvass of the town and every cess pool and closet will be given a dose of the mixture. Results will be noted and if satisfactory, it is believed that the individual residents of the town will take sufficient interest in the matter to use the same method from time to time in an effort to exterminate the insects.

Aside from the discussion of mosquitoes the council consummated another loan of \$1500, thus making a total of \$4500 that has been loaned within the past year and making a total of \$6000 that has been placed at interest pending the maturity of the city water works bonds. It is estimated that at this rate within five years there will be a sufficient amount at interest to cover the bonds and at that time it will be ten years before all the bonds mature. The interest now coming in annually from the different loans is \$450 and it is worthy of note that after this loan of \$1500 has been made, as soon as the collections for the past month have been made from water users, the water fund will again have in it a little over a thousand dollars. It merely goes to demonstrate as has been demonstrated time and again that under the present conservative management of the city water system,

it is the best thing the town has and is not only of immense benefit and comfort to the residents of the town but is also more than supporting and a good paying proposition.

### ANOTHER ELECTION.

That For High School Bonds Comes Off May 23rd.

This month is an unusual one in the matter of elections. One exciting one has just been brought to a close and toward the latter part of the month there will be two more, the Union High school bond election and the city election. The bond election takes place on Saturday the 23rd of May and the following notice of said election has been posted in conformity with the law:

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held by the qualified taxpayers of Tempe Union High School District on Saturday the 23rd day of May, 1908, for the purpose of determining the question whether the bonds of said district shall be issued to the amount of \$50,000.00.

The proceeds of said bonds to be used exclusively for the following purposes:

1. The purchase of a school site, lot or grounds for said Union High School District.

2. For the construction and completion of a high school building on such grounds for said district.

3. For the purchase and installation of any and all necessary furniture, apparatus, laboratory, library, shops, appliances and supplies, for the complete equipment of said building.

4. For improving the school ground or site belonging to said district and upon which said building shall be located.

Said election will be held at the public school building at the corner of Mill avenue and Eighth street, in Tempe, Arizona, and the names of the three judges who will be in charge of said election and conduct the same are: Geo. M. Frizell, J. C. Goodwin, and Carl Gustafson.

Said election will be held and the polls will be open between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon on said 23rd day of May, 1908.

Said bonds when issued shall be in the denomination of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars, each, and shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding six (6) per centum per annum, payable annually, and said bonds shall be redeemable within twenty years from the date of issue.

### SHOOTING AT GRANITE REEF.

Mexican Laborer Takes Shot at Deputy Sheriff Saturday Evening.

Deputy Sheriff Dorrane, located at Granite Reef, came down from that place yesterday morning and swore out a warrant for the arrest of Jose de Luz Gonzales, a laborer employed at the Reef on the government works, who on Saturday, while under the influence of liquor took a shot at Deputy Sheriff Dorrane.

Saturday evening after the closing of the polls there, several Mexicans became intoxicated and Dorrane noticed two of these who were particularly boisterous, and approached them, telling them to disperse and go to their homes. Gonzales, one of the men, went to his tent and securing his revolver stationed himself a few paces outside of his tent and fired at the deputy, then retreating back in the tent in company with several companions. The shot went wide of the mark, however, and Dorrane was on the point of following up the men, but was advised by bystanders to swear out a warrant instead and make the arrest later, after the men had sobered up, as any attempt to arrest them at that time might result in bloodshed. Acting upon this advice Deputy Sheriff Dorrane came down and secured the warrant.
