### SPEAKS GOOD WORDS FOR WATER CONGRESS

The Return of One of the Delegates To Albuquerque.

C. C. Manning who has just returned from the sessions of the national irrigation congress and has much to say in connection with the big exhibit which has just finished, one of the most memorable conventions yet held. Besides the display of agricultural and mineral products from different sections of the great southwest, all of which were particularly fine, there were fine displays by the different branches of the reclamation service and the forestry service. The Santa Fe Railroad company exhibited many of its beautiful paintings in its own building. Many of these were by famous artists and depicted life and scenes in the southwest.

An interesting portion of the exhibits made by the reclamation service was that of the immense photographs and transparent pictures of the different government projects now in the course of construction in different parts of the country. The transparent pictures being particularly fine, having the effect of making the different objects stand out in relief. The dam at Granite Reef was the subject of one of these plates and the intake at the Roosevelt dam was another. The forestry service had several views of the "big trees" of California on similar plates.

Among the many other attractions furnished for the entertainment of the guests during their stay in the New Mexico town was the military feature, there being two troops of U. S. Cavalry from Ft. Wingate, N. M. and cadets from the University of New Mexico and Roosevelt Military college. In a prize drill given, the University cadets came out with the honors. Several
