EXAMINATION FOR POSTOFFICE CLERKS

Postmaster Newell Has Instructions Governing Civil Service Examination to Be Held in Mesa.

Here is a chance for ambitious young men and young ladies who desire to qualify as clerks in the postal service. Postmaster Newell has received instructions from the department that an examination for clerks will be held under the civil service rules at Mesa on the 7th day of March, 1912. The official notice reads: "Civil Service Examination Postoffice Clerk."

"An open competitive examination for clerk will be held at the postoffice, Mesa, Arizona, March 7, 1912. Application blanks will be supplied upon application to the postmaster." The tests to which the applicants will be subjected are indicated as follows:

Spelling, twenty words; arithmetic, simple tests; letter writing, not less than ten words; penmanship; copying from plain copy; reading addresses. Instead of having the examination take place in the postoffice, the postmaster intends to get the use of the Commercial club rooms for that day, where the applicants will have a better chance to show what they can do. No doubt there will be several applicants and, naturally, the ones showing the greatest degree of proficiency will have the preference. A civil service examination is a good practice, even if one never intends to become a postoffice clerk.
