for the purchase of forty (40) District Number Eight School Bonds, with accrued interest. Said bonds being in denomination of Five Hundred Dollars each, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. Said Bonds to be dated July first, 1914, and payable twenty years from the date thereof. Both principal and interest payable in Gold Coin, Lawful Money of the United States at the office of the Treasurer of Maricopa County. Bonds to be delivered to the purchaser thereof in the City of Phoenix, Arizona, at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said Maricopa County.

These Bonds are issued under the authority of Title XI, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913. All bids must be accompanied by a certified check upon a National Bank or upon a bank in Arizona, for One Thousand Dollars payable to the Treasurer of Maricopa County. No bid for less than par value and accrued interest to date of delivery will be received. The checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned upon rejection of each bid. Bids at a rate of interest less than six (6%) per cent will be considered.

SUMMER UNION SERVICES OF TEMPE CHURCHES

Congregational, Baptist, Christian and Methodist Churches Will Unite in Evening Meetings

Churchgoers in Tempe will unite in worship Sunday evenings from now on through the summer months, holding their services in turn each week at the four churches of the town. This schedule will go into effect the coming Sunday evening and remain in vogue until the first Sunday in September when each of the pastors will resume their regular evening services in their respective places of worship.

The union meetings will be started day after tomorrow evening at the Christian church, Rev. Charles H. Dains of the Congregational church will fill the pulpit.

The work this summer will be decidedly lighter upon the pastors than it was a year ago. To date, none of the four clergymen who are uniting in the union services, have signified any intention of enjoying a vacation away from Tempe this summer. Thus it leaves pulpit duty for each of the ministers in the evening but once a month, instead of every other week as was the case a year ago. Rev. R. E. Dunlap of the Christian church will devote a portion of his Sunday evenings to work at Chandler, Ariz., where he recently organized a church. With the Baptists and Christians of that community working together on the plan, the organization is growing rapidly.

Forenoon services will be conducted for a while at least in all of the Tempe churches as in the past. It is possible that within a month or so one or two of the denominations will discontinue with meetings altogether until fall.

AUTO TRUCKS VS WOODEN CULVERTS

It is the opinion of Road Supervisor Hugh Dana that the old time wooden culvert is a form of roadway building that served an ideal purpose during its time but that with the coming of the automobile truck and its heavy loads that it is no longer able to cope with the immense increase in traffic that daily passes along the Salt River Valley highways. The past week has been one of constant calls for repair work on the wooden structures. In Lehi there was an extraordinary lot of damage but that was caused by a traction engine pulling a threshing machine. It is said by the supervisor that one engine broke through five wooden culverts. However, while the threshing engine used to be the great cause for wooden culvert trouble it is no more. Now times the auto truck at a rate of ten or fifteen miles an hour and several times daily bouncing on the light culverts has placed them in bad repute.

The new style steel culverts that are being placed in on practically all roadways are proving very satisfactory and are an important factor in the good roads movement. The town of Mesa has not reached that stage of putting in the steel culverts but it is presumed that in the near future that the new style of road building will be followed out with in the city rather than try to continue with the old time wooden culvert that required repairs frequently.
