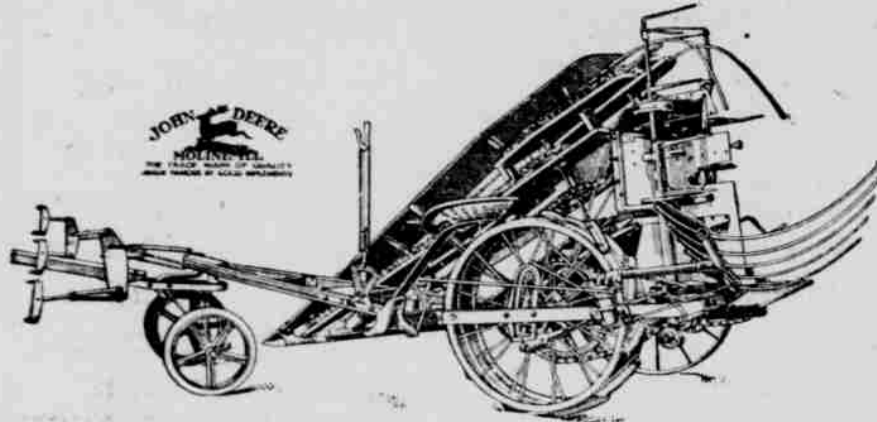

CONGREGATIONALISTS SELECT NEW PASTOR

Rev. Mr. Hand of California May Take Charge of Local Church

Rev. Mr. Hand will be approached at once on the proposition of visiting the local pastorate and of taking this as his permanent field.
