MARSHALL BANQUET BY THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEMBERS

Members and Wives to Entertain Mr. and Mrs. Vice President Next Wednesday Evening

Hon. T. R. Marshall, vice president of the United States will be the guest of honor at a sumptuous banquet to be given by the members of the Chamber of Commerce next Wednesday night. This was announced following a directors' meeting yesterday.

The banquet will be given at the Hotel Adams, the dining room of which will be elaborately decorated under the direction of a committee—Dr. John Dennis, W. S. Humbert and E. A. Marshall. Invitations will be extended to the wives of the members.

A special committee will be gathered today to pass on a program of speakers. The direction of the affair will be in the hands of the entertainment committee, H. E. Trille, chairman.

EXTRA FEES MAY PEEVE WATER RENT APPLICANTS

An announcement was received from the reclamation commission yesterday that a fee of twenty-five cents is to be charged for filling out applications for rented water. It is expected to cause considerable dissatisfaction among the holders of the 32,000 acres of land not on a basis of permanent water rights. It is upon the owners of this land that the twenty-five cents charge will fall.

The fee is in line with the economy policies of the new reclamation commission. Few land owners can fill out the intricate blanks used in applications for rent water, and the aid of a clerk has to be solicited. Although on salaries that must ultimately be paid by the water users, the clerks are to bring in fees for each application filled out.

Furthermore, it is announced that when the entire membership of the project ranges itself before the counter to take out permanent water rights prior to opening the project on December 1, a fee of 50 cents will be charged for filling out each blank.

ILLNESS OF A JUROR POSTPONES TRIAL

The sudden illness of M. J. Green, a juror in the \$12,500 damage suit of W. G. Moore against the Arizona Eastern railroad caused the postponement of the case. Green was taken ill shortly after noon yesterday. He was so greatly improved last evening that it was thought that the case might be continued this morning.

Prior to adjournment the time was given over to the plaintiff's witnesses who testified as to the damage done to Moore's property by the flood waters of the Agua Fria. Moore, who was on the stand the previous day, continued his story of the injury to his hand caused by the alleged damming of the railroad bridge by trees and debris and the breaking of the dykes.

Walter L. Hastings and W. O. Ray bore out Moore's testimony. They gave practically the same account of the destruction. The property value they said dropped from \$50 or \$100 an acre to no market value whatever.

Not half the plaintiff's witnesses have been called and it is more than likely the case which is being heard before Judge Stanford, will occupy the remainder of the week.

SPANISH WAR VETERANS TO GIVE ENTERTAINMENT

The Spanish War Veterans' charity entertainment will be given at the new armory at First and Polk streets on Friday evening, November 19.

The admission will be one dollar per couple, and the evening will be devoted to dancing, cards and vaudeville. James Lavin is the head of the entertainment committee. A good orchestra has been secured and a pleasant evening is promised to all who attend.

DIES AT SANTA BARBARA

The many friends of Mrs. John Massey Treble, of Toronto, Canada, who spent last winter in the city of Phoenix, will be grieved to know of her death, which occurred in Santa Barbara, Cal., yesterday. Mrs. Treble was well known in Toronto for her many charities and acts of philanthropy.

SUIT FOR OSTRICHES

For the recovery of alleged personal property consisting of ostriches or \$1900, which he declares the value of the same, Dr. Wylie Wylie is demanding judgment against Fernand Verwilghem, Paul Janssens and Leon Van Dorpe, doing business under the name of the Belco-America Ostrich company. Dr. Wylie filed complaint in the superior court yesterday in which he sets forth that the defendants are wrongfully and against his consent in possession of his property.
