Mr. Garcia will go as a stenographer if the army needs one, but he declares that "I feel it is the duty of each and every one of us to help our nation in this great war which we are now engaged in, and so I have been thinking that I would volunteer my services."

**HUNT LAWYERS READY TO FILE**

The final document that probably will be filed by attorneys for either side was submitted yesterday when the attorneys for Governor Hunt filed their answer to the motion for a re-hearing of the governorship contest appeal in which the supreme court ruled in favor of Governor Campbell.

**LYMAN MAY BE KEPT AT WORK AS ARCHITECT**

John H. Lyman, Jr., engaged by the former commissioner of state institutions as supervising architect of the work of constructing new buildings at the University of Arizona at Tucson, probably will continue in that capacity under the new commission.

An agreement to that effect was reached yesterday afternoon at a joint session of the board of regents of the university and the commission of state institutions. This agreement is contingent, however, upon the acceptance by Mr. Lyman of the conditions named. The joint meeting was held at the state house.

The meeting of the board of regents and the commission of state institutions was a long one, and it was nearly 4 o'clock when the session was concluded and a brief typewritten synopsis of the results of the meeting and the agreement reached between the two bodies was given out for publication.

From the wording of the agreement it is apparent that it is the desire of the board of regents of the university that Mr. Lyman be continued in his present capacity in order that there might be no unnecessary delay in the completion of the buildings under way. However, as stated in the agreement, the arrangement with Mr. Lyman, if he accepts, is to be only a temporary one. The matter of final remuneration with him is to be decided upon at a later date.

Apparently, the situation has cleared much with reference to the relations of Mr. Lyman and the commission of state institutions, and instead of an abrupt severing of relations and consequent law suits, the architect continues for a time at least, with a further settlement in the future not an impossibility.

Following is the text of the agreement made yesterday between the board of regents of the university and the commission of state institutions with regard to constructive work at the university:

"The board of regents is to advise the commission of state institutions in writing that they consider it essential that Mr. Lyman be retained as architect and supervisor of construction of the mining and engineering buildings and shops.

"Mr. Lyman is to furnish two complete sets of plans and specifications before being paid anything in excess of \$7,500.

"An inspector is to be appointed by the commission of state institutions who shall also act as assistant to the purchasing agent in making out material lists and specifications.

"This agreement between the board of regents and the commission of state institutions is to be only temporary. It will be confirmed later by the commission of state institutions without radical departure from the terms as herein stated.

"The claims of Mr. Lyman now being held will be passed upon as soon as it is possible to check them.

"The board of regents is to continue to use its present interest fund of approximately \$23,000.

"The question of the final remuneration of Mr. Lyman is to be considered later.

"All of the above arrangements is to apply to the shop building as well as to the mining and engineering buildings."

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Buckeye Irrigation company will be held on Monday, January 14, at Buckeye. Among the questions to come before the meeting will be the expediting of the work on hand of enlarging the canal and of a amendment providing for an issue of new stock of the company sufficient to cover all the lands entitled, under a recent decree of court, to have water.

When the present enlarging work is completed, the canal will be sufficiently large to carry water to irrigate 23,000 acres. The work is now about one-half done. A large walking excavator is rapidly doing the digging.

They also will consider the putting in of a sausage dam, an overflow dam to raise the bed of the river to where it was before breaks in the dam caused deeper places to be cut.

The Buckeye Irrigation company is one of the largest irrigation companies in Arizona. The farms under the project are in a prosperous condition. Land values are rapidly advancing. One of the best ranches under the canal recently was rented at \$20 an acre year for five years, with guaranteed payment of the rent. This ranch will be put into cotton this year.
