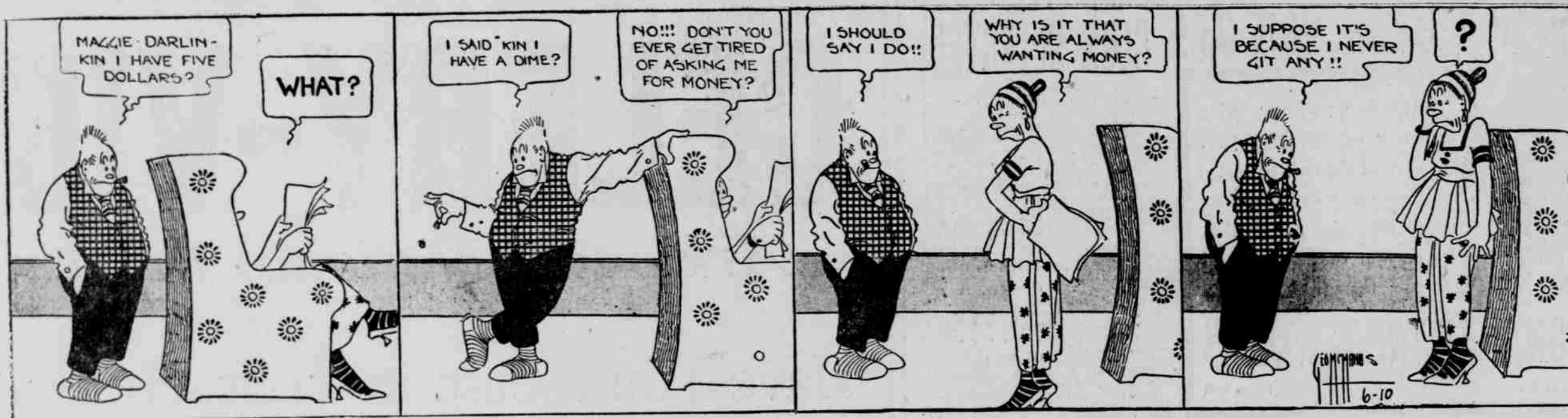

NEW YORK, June 8.—(National)—New York and St. Louis broke even in a double header here today. The Giants won the first game easily but St. Louis triumphed in the second in an 11 inning pitchers battle between Doak and Sallee.

New York won the first game by scoring six runs off Sherdel in the fifth inning four of the runs being scored after Kavanaugh muffed a pop fly with two out. The deadlock in the second game was broken in the eleventh inning when Young fell and dropped Snyder's long fly, allowing Smith and Kavanaugh to score. The Giants claimed Young had held the ball long enough to make a legal catch, but the claim was not allowed. Manager McGraw was ordered from the field by Umpire Byron. A glass was thrown at the umpire from the upper stand. Jack Smith, St. Louis outfielder, was put out of the first game.
