RESOLUTION NO. 364

A resolution of the Commission of the City of Phoenix declaring its intention to improve alley in Block 82, Original Townsite, in the City of Phoenix, and determining with bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses thereof, and declaring the work or improvement to be of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and that the costs of said work or improvement shall be assessed upon a certain district and providing that the proposed work or improvement shall be performed under Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona 1913, Civil Code, and amendments thereto.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX:

SECTION 1
That the public interest and convenience require, and that it is the intention of the Commission of the City of Phoenix, to order the following work to be performed, to-wit:

1. That the alley in Block 82, Original Townsite of Phoenix be graded and paved with bituminous concrete base as per Specification No. 25A.

All of the above work or improvement to be done in accordance with that certain set of plans approved and adopted by the Commission of the City of Phoenix on the 11th day of June, 1919, and on file in the office of the City Engineer in Book Five of Street Improvement Plans, on Page 84, and in further accordance with the following specifications:

Standard Specifications of the City of Phoenix, Numbers 19 and 25A.

All of which above specifications are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Phoenix. Said plans and specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of said work and made a part hereof.

Reference is hereby made to the bituminous license agreement of Warren Brothers company, of Boston, Mass., dated April 2nd, 1918, and on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Phoenix.

SECTION 2.
That the said contemplated work or improvement, in the opinion of the Commission, is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and that the said Commission hereby makes the costs and expenses of said work or improvement chargeable upon a district, and hereby declares that the district in said City of Phoenix, benefited by the said work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

All of Block 82, Original Townsite.

Reference is hereby made to Book One of Assessment District Diagrams, Page 24, on file in the office of the City Engineer of the City of Phoenix, for a more complete and detailed description of said district.

SECTION 3.
The said Commission finds that public convenience requires that serial bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses of such work or improvement, and said Commission determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent each assessment of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or more for the costs and expenses of said work or improvement. Said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until all is paid, and the interest shall be payable semi-annually by coupon on the second day of January and July respectively of each year, at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal sum and interest are paid.

SECTION 4.
That these improvements shall be made, and all proceedings therein shall be taken; that the Superintendent of Streets shall post notices thereof; that the City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Resolution of Intention and shall cause the same to be published in the Arizona Republican, a daily newspaper published and circulated in the City of Phoenix and hereby designated for that purpose, that the City Engineer shall prepare duplicate diagrams of the district hereinabove described in Section 2, of this Resolution of Intention, to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, under and in accordance with the provisions of Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona 1913 Civil Code, and subsequent acts amendatory thereto.

Every such proposal must be accompanied by a certified check for five per cent (5%) of the amount of the bid included in the proposals as a guarantee of the intent of the contractor to enter into a contract with School District No. 17 of Maricopa County, State of Arizona, to well and truly perform all the matters included in the said proposal or as liquidated damages in the event of the failure on the part of the contractor to enter into the contract as above named.

And said certified check will be returned to the contractors whose proposals are not accepted, and to the successful contractor upon the execution of a satisfactory bond and contract as hereinafter provided.

Proposals may be submitted on the above named buildings separately or on both together.

School District No. 17 of Maricopa County reserves the right to reject any and all proposals or to withhold the award if for any reason it may so determine.

All bids should be mailed or delivered to School District No. 17, in care of C. L. Smith, Clerk of the Board of Trustees, Route 3, Phoenix, Arizona.

All bids will be opened by the Board of Trustees of School District No. 17 in the Pendergast School House at eight o'clock in the evening of the 12th day of July, 1919, and thereafter considered.

Each bidder is requested to state in his proposal the time in which he will guarantee to complete the construction of the work proposed.

All bids should be sealed and properly marked.

A FRENCH PATRIOT'S LETTER

(Continental Edition of the London Mail)

Nice.—A remarkable story of the patriotism and devotion shown by a French-American family is related in the Petit Nicols.

At the outbreak of war a Frenchman named Calles, 44 years old, who kept a drug store in Los Angeles, Cal., left his wife, daughter and two sons to come over and fight for his native country. He was mortally wounded before Verdun in January, 1915, but before dying had the following cablegram sent to his wife:

"I die facing the enemy. Let our two sons come out and take my place in the ranks. Adieu."

On receipt of this cablegram the two sons, Joseph and George, joined up and in due course arrived in France. Joseph was killed in 1917, not far from the place where his father met his death. He was 24 years old and was also a druggist.

George Calles went through much fighting without a wound until at 10 o'clock on the morning of November 11, just before the armistice, he was badly gassed. He recovered and has been in convalescence at Nice pending his departure for his California home to resume his legal studies.
