H. O. BURSUM RENAMED CHAIRMAN COMMITTEE

BUT FEW CHANGES MADE IN THE COMMITTEE—CHAS. V. SAFFORD RE-ELECTED SECRETARY.

The territorial republican central committee, at its meeting in Las Vegas yesterday, re-elected Hon. H. O. Bursum, of Socorro, chairman of the committee, his name being proposed by Hon. W. H. Andrews, who had a few hours previously been renominated for delegate to congress. He was unanimously re-elected, showing that the party throughout the territory has great faith in his ability to lead them again to victory.

On motion of Hon. Solomon Luna, which was duly seconded, Charles V. Safford of San Juan county, the territory travelling auditor, was re-elected secretary of the committee.

The new central committee made a motion that fifteen members of the general central committee be named by the delegate candidate and the chairman as an executive committee with one committeeman at large. The motion was seconded and the names of the fifteen to serve as an executive committee will be announced later.

DISTRICT MEETINGS TO SELECT CANDIDATES

OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY FOR COUNCIL AND HOUSE OF NEXT LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

At Las Vegas, yesterday, delegates from several of the legislative council and house districts held meetings and nominated their candidates for the next territorial legislative assembly.

The delegates of Santa Fe and Sandoval counties met and a majority of them declared in favor of E. A. Miera, of Cuba, Sandoval county, as their candidate for this legislative council district for the upper house of the next legislature. T. D. Catron of Santa Fe opposed Mr. Miera.

E. C. Abbott, an attorney of Santa Fe, was nominated as the candidate of this district for the legislative house, although R. L. Baca had been named for the house by the county convention held at Santa Fe the other day.

W. D. Murray, president of the Silver City bank, was chosen for the council by the delegates of the territorial legislative council district, composed of the counties of Grant, Luna and Doña Ana.

H. H. Betts was nominated for the house to represent the fifteenth legislative representative district composed of Grant and Luna counties. Mr. Betts is a prominent republican of Silver City, and is serving by appointment, the unexpired term of assessor of Grant county.

The sixteenth legislative house district, composed of Doña Ana and Otero counties, was left to the republicans of Doña Ana county, and the nomination will be announced in a few days.

Frank W. Beach of Orogrande, Otero county, was nominated as the candidate for the house to represent the seventeenth legislative house district, composed of the counties of Grant, Luna, Otero and Doña Ana. Mr. Beach is practically a new man in territorial politics, he coming to New Mexico two years ago from St. Joseph, Mo., and is manager of a mining company operating at Orogrande.

Carl A. Dalles, of Willard, Torrance county, was chosen as the candidate for council to represent the legislative council district, composed of the counties of Lincoln, Otero and Torrance. For the legislative house to represent this district the republicans of Lincoln county will name the candidate.

The nominations for the other legislative council and house districts will be announced in a few days. In about a week or ten days the republicans will have candidates in every legislative council and house district in the territory.

CATRON AGAINST NEW APPOINTMENT

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 1.—Hon. T. B. Catron this afternoon filed a petition in the district court asking for an injunction enjoining the county commissioners of Santa Fe county from calling an election for members of the legislature from the district composed of Sandoval and Santa Fe counties, under the new apportionment made by Governor Hagerman.

Mr. Catron's petition contains typewritten pages and states that the governor has not legally made such an apportionment, with reference to Sandoval county, as the legislature has settled that question by fixing one representative for Sandoval county, attaching it to Bernalillo county.

Judge McFie signed a temporary order requiring the commissioners to show cause why the injunction should not be made permanent and set the hearing for next Saturday.

P. J. McShane, a resident of Chicago, and Miss Ora Wagoner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Wagoner, a popular and attractive young lady of this city, were united in marriage on Saturday afternoon at the home of the bride's parents on Marquette avenue. The wedding was a quiet one, and was witnessed only by the parents of the bride and her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Will Wagoner.

New Regulation of Certificate.
Tokio, Oct. 1.—Beginning today new regulations relating to the production of certificates of origin will be rigidly enforced in this country. According to these regulations business firms wishing to enjoy the benefits of special trade arrangements recognized in the customs duties law of Japan must furnish the proof of the fact that the goods they are importing are the product or manufacture of the locality to which special conventions are applicable, except on postal matter and goods, the dutiable value of which does not exceed 100 yen.

The proof must be furnished by means of a certificate of origin by the Japanese consulate or commercial agency at the place of production, manufacture or shipment of the goods or where the Japanese have no such consulate or agency by the custom house or other governing or police officer, or by the chamber of commerce of the locality. The certificate of origin must show the marks, numbers, description, number of packages, weights and measurements of the goods and the place of manufacture.

All goods which are not accompanied by the necessary certificates at the time of their clearance through the custom house at the port of entry will be liable to the duties of the statutory or maximum tariff.
