One of the most novel entertainments ever arranged in Albuquerque is to be given at the Elks theater the evening of August 27. The "old folks" of the city will give the entertainment and will be assisted by a number of young folks, including the best singers and musicians of the city. The proceeds will go towards the education and care of an orphan, and on this account the entertainment is worthy of the best patronage.

The entertainment will consist of a musical program, the musicians appearing in colonial costume. A chorus of thirty voices will take part and Mrs. Frank and other well known soloists will sing. The announcement and program is made in the following form:

### THE BAR ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING AT SANTA FE

Will Be Held Two Days and Unusually Interesting Program Will Be Given

The New Mexico Bar association will hold its annual meeting at Santa Fe August 31 and September 1, and a program of unusual interest has been prepared. The president of the association, Alonzo B. McMillen, has issued a circular letter explaining the purpose of the association and giving the program as it has been arranged. The letter says:

Albuquerque, N. M., August 15.  
Dear Sir—The twenty-second annual meeting of the New Mexico Bar association will be held in the city of Santa Fe on August 31 and September 1, 1908, the justice of the supreme court having consented to adjourn the session fixed for August 31 until the close of the meetings of the association. This arrangement will allow all who desire to do so to attend the meeting of the bar association and the sessions of the supreme court on the same trip.

The railroads have granted a single rate fare for round trip for the occasion and tickets will be good from August 29 to September 5. This will allow a week for recreation in the delightful summer climate of Santa Fe. The city is rich in historic associations and is surrounded by many places of great scenic beauty that are easy of access.

We will have an excellent program for the association meetings and the well known hospitality of the people of Santa Fe is sufficient guaranty that all those attending will find ample entertainment.

This meeting will be particularly important because the officers elect and the committees appointed will have an opportunity to co-operate in securing needed legislation of great importance to the lawyers, especially in the line of practice and procedure. This association has accomplished valuable work in that direction in the past and can and ought to be an influential factor in advancing and encouraging intelligent legislative action in the future.

I wish to urge upon the members of this association the duty to lay aside their ordinary business and attend and help to make this session of the association what every session should be, an unqualified success.

The lawyers who are not members of the association are invited to sign the enclosed application for membership and send with the necessary fee to the secretary, K. K. Scott, of Roswell, N. M., or to the undersigned.

You cannot afford to stand aloof from the territorial organization of your profession that is formed as its by-laws provide: "To cultivate the science of jurisprudence; to promote reform in law; to facilitate the administration of justice; to elevate the standard of integrity, honesty and courtesy in the legal profession; to encourage a thorough and liberal legal education and to cherish a spirit of brotherhood among the members thereof."

These are objects worthy of endeavor and we trust that you will approve them by accepting our invitation to apply for membership.

But, whether you are a member or intend to become such or not, we will invite you to attend our sessions.

The local committee of the Santa Fe bar has taken great interest in this meeting and is making elaborate preparations for the entertainment of visiting lawyers and their wives who are cordially invited to attend.

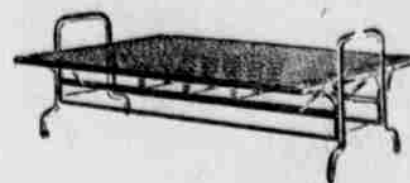
