M of December 18th, sailors from the German man of war, Adler Olsa and Elier, attacked Mataafas. The soldiers were under the direction of the German consul and Captian Fritz, senior German naval officers. As a result of the encounter 22 German sailors were killed and 32 wound-Since then the Elman men of war chips burned, American houses and flags torn down, U. S. flags seized, American citizens in the neutral waters of Apia harbor, and have taken them as prisoners on board the German men of war."

MOST TOO SENSATIONAL.
