FEWER ALIENS NOW WORK ON RAILROAD

The statement in the Gateway of two days ago to the effect that aliens have been laid off the government railroad work at Anchorage was at least partly correct, and was probably entirely correct. No statement has been given out by the commission about the matter and the Gateway only secured the news from persons arriving here from Anchorage, but the truth of the statement has been borne out by queries to Anchorage. If people will remember, this paper printed some months ago that a change would come in this respect in the railroad work and also in the wages paid. It is now clear that the commission has come to the conclusion to bring the change about. The following telegram was received by the Gateway, in answer to an inquiry:

No official announcement has been made with respect to alien labor although it is a fact that less aliens are being employed than formerly. — (Seward Gateway.)

JUDGE TAYLOR'S SUCCESSOR SLATED

It is reported here that J. Langlois Bell, an attorney of Dawson, will succeed the late George L. Taylor as police magistrate at this place. The position is a good one, paying \$5,400

per annum, including house rent. Mr. Bell came to Dawson fourteen years ago as assistant gold commissioner but has been engaged in the practice of his profession, that of law, for the past ten years. His family consists of a wife and grown daughter. His eldest daughter is the wife of Inspector Telford of the Royal N. W. M. P. The Bells will probably come to this place before the end of the year. — (Whitehorse Star.)

DANIELS ASKS IF GUARDS MAY SHOOT AT GERMANS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Secretary of War Josephus Daniels has asked Secretary of State Robert Lansing today whether mariners guarding the interned German sailors at Norfolk may fire on those who attempt to escape.

The inquiry was made by the navy secretary in connection with the escape of a sailor named Thierly from the Prinz Eitel Friedrich at Norfolk. Daniels asked how far this government may legally go in enforcing internment.

Special reference was made regarding the right to fire on escaping men. Admiral Beatty, at Norfolk, as a precautionary measure to prevent and immediately detect further escapes, today instituted a new order on the interned vessels. Three times each day hereafter—morning, noon and night—the crews will be mustered for roll call.

AMERICAN SAID TO BE PRISONER IN SIBERIA

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Carl Bado, brother-in-law of Ernst Janssen of this city is said to be a prisoner of the Russian government in the Siberian mines. The State Department at Washington has instructed the American consul at Vladivostok to make an investigation and report immediately. When last heard from Bado was connected with the German army. He is said to have been sent by the Russians to Verchne, Uinsk, in the military district of Irkutsk, Siberia.

CANADIAN WHEAT FOR MARKET INCREASES

CHICAGO, Nov. 29. — Farmers in the three northwestern Canadian provinces have 121,203,000 bushel of wheat to market, against 39,127,000 bushel last year, as shown by the Northwestern Grain Dealers' report. The total crop was 308,000,000 bushel.

PITTSBURGH MAN MAY BE EXPELLED FROM CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—George W. Eberhardt, of Pittsburgh, who was suspended from the New York Stock exchange for one year, is also a member of the Chicago Board of Trade. His offense was said to be trading for bucket shops. It is expected that he will be called upon by the Chicago Board officials to make an explanation. The rules here prescribe expulsion for his offense.

SHIPPING HOUSE GETS ORDER FOR LUMBER

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—A contract has been awarded to W. R. Grace & Co., of New York for 8,000,000 feet of lumber which will be used in reconstruction work made necessary by earth slides into the Panama canal.

GERMAN MINE FIELDS DESTROY ENGLISH SHIPS

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 29.—Twelve big merchant steamships, running into a German mine field, at the mouth of the River Thames, were blown up in a single day, probably with serious loss of life, three weeks ago, according to the master of the Scandinavian-American line steamship Tomak, just arrived at Philadelphia.

The captain also declared that the Great Central railway station in London, one of the big London terminals, was leveled to the ground in one of the zeppelin raids, which he witnessed from the deck of the Tomak. He confirmed earlier reports of the capture of German submarines on a large scale.

KERN WANTS EXTRA TAX ON TELEGRAPH MESSAGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Senator John W. Kern, of Indiana, will introduce a bill on the opening day of Congress which will put the burden of the war tax on telegraph and telephone messages on the companies and lift it from the public. Senator Kern takes the view that Congress did not intend that the tax should be shifted to the patrons.

U. S. STEEL TO EXPEND \$10,000,000 IN EXPANSION

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Further evidence of the brilliant outlook for the steel industry was afforded by the announcement that the United States Steel corporation, is compelled to make provisions for increasing its capacity. Chairman Gary of the Steel Corporation said yesterday:

"We have decided to make additional improvements at Gary, Ind., consisting of two blast furnaces, blooming mill, duplexing plant, etc., costing over \$7,500,000.

"We have also decided to make additional improvements at Youngstown, O., and Pittsburgh which will cost between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000.

BOY WHO KILLED FATHER ALSO VIOLATED GAME LAWS

The hearing of George Brown, 17-year-old boy of Seldovia, for the illegal killing of a cow moose was held in the Commissioner's Court and the boy was found guilty, fined fifty dollars and sentence suspended awaiting a second offense. Brown was brought over from Seldovia by Game Warden Baughman last night. Young Brown accidentally shot and killed his father recently while hunting moose near the same section. — (Seward Gateway)

FORMER REPRESENTATIVE HOPEFUL FOR KATALLA

Robert D. Gray, United States commissioner at Katalla, is in Valdez to attend to official business before the district court. He reports Katalla as hopeful of being able to open her coal fields soon. — (Valdez Prospect.)

BOARD WALK TO SCOW BAY COMPLETED

PETERSBURG, Nov. 20.—The building of the board walk along the beach at Scow Bay was completed last Saturday, and Olaf Arness has notified J. C. Hayes, of the road commission, that the job is ready for inspection. The walk is 5,820 feet in length. Although the specifications called for but two planks in width for part of the way, Mr. Arness used three planks the entire length of the walk, and also renewed numerous portions of the old single planking. This extra work and material cost him about \$50, which he contributed, in addition to taking the contract at cost, in order to make the job substantial and satisfactory. — (Petersburg Report.)

MONEY ALLOTTED FOR TOLOVANA MAIL TRAIL

FAIRBANKS, Nov. 8.—In a wire received last evening from the disbursing officer of the Alaska road commission, R. J. Sommers, the superintendent for the interior, was notified that money had been allotted for staking the mail trail from Tanana to Kaitag, and he was instructed to proceed with the work at the earliest opportunity. Last evening, Mr. Sommers said that the work probably would be given to the mail carrier, as he was the only one in a position to do it for the money allowed for the work.

The only other work to be done by the commission this winter will be that on the lower Tanana river, now under way in charge of Abe McKinnon, the staking of the Circle trail, now under way in charge of F. C. Irons, and the Tolovana trail work, which is rapidly nearing completion. — (Fairbanks Times.)
