FIRST SEMESTER WORK REVIEWED

Supt. Lanz Says Semester Just Ended Was Satisfactory In Every Respect.

The semester just ended has been a very successful one for the Juneau Public Schools from every point of view, according to Supt. J. E. Lanz. In the Senior High School, the percentage of failures for the first semester was only eight and one half per cent. This is about one and one half per cent less than the average number of failures. The Junior High School shows nine per cent failures. In view of the fact that the requirements have been materially raised, this is a very creditable showing. From the general attitude about the school, it seems certain that the new semester will net even better results.

In attendance and punctuality the Junior High School leads with 93.39 per cent, followed closely with 93.33 per cent and 92.75 per cent by the Elementary School and the Senior High School respectively. By grades the attendance and punctuality percentages are as follows:



GIVE COURSE IN ALASKA HISTORY

Course to Be Complete—Russian Period as Well as Modern Times Included.

A new course has been added to the course of the Senior High School. It is the history and government of Alaska. During this semester, Supt. J. E. Lanz, who is in charge, plans to cover the subject as thoroughly as possible. Beginning with the discovery of Alaska by the Russians, their many explorations, taking also the different forms of government the land has been ruled by. The class will study the climatic conditions, industries and development of each division separately if the material to study this can be obtained. Quite extensively they will study the great future which Alaska has in store in her development of coal mines, oil, and other minerals, and agricultural resources.
