

## DOUGLAS ISLAND NEWS

Douglas Home Guttered by Fire  
Resulting from Overheated  
Stove—Much Damage.

Several hundred dollars damage resulted from a fire that consumed much of the interior wood work wall paper and decorations of the Guest House on Third and B. streets last night and which was only extinguished after two streams of water and a considerable quantity of chemicals were poured on the blaze. Gus Wahto, with his family occupied the building, and he was quite severely burned about the face and hands in rescuing some of his children from the blaze and in trying to control it.

The fire started about ten o'clock and was caused by excessive heat in the kitchen stove. The family was in another room and did not know of the start until the kitchen was fairly in a blaze. It was with the utmost difficulty that the parents rescued their four small children who were sleeping in various parts of the building. With the exception of a trunk, no personal belongings were saved from the fire and water.

The fire alarm was answered by a sled, hose cart and chemical engine from Hose Company No. One, and a chemical engine from Company Four. Two streams of water, one fresh and one salt, and two chemical streams were played on the interior of the building for some time before the blaze was entirely subdued. On account of the house being charged with electricity, many of the firemen were quite badly shocked but kept at their posts on the various posts on the hose lines.

The Moyal house was one of the newest and best residences in Douglas and built but a few years ago. Its owner lives in Tacoma at the present time. The alarm of last night was the first turned in at Douglas in more than a year.

HOLD LUNCHEON AND SALE

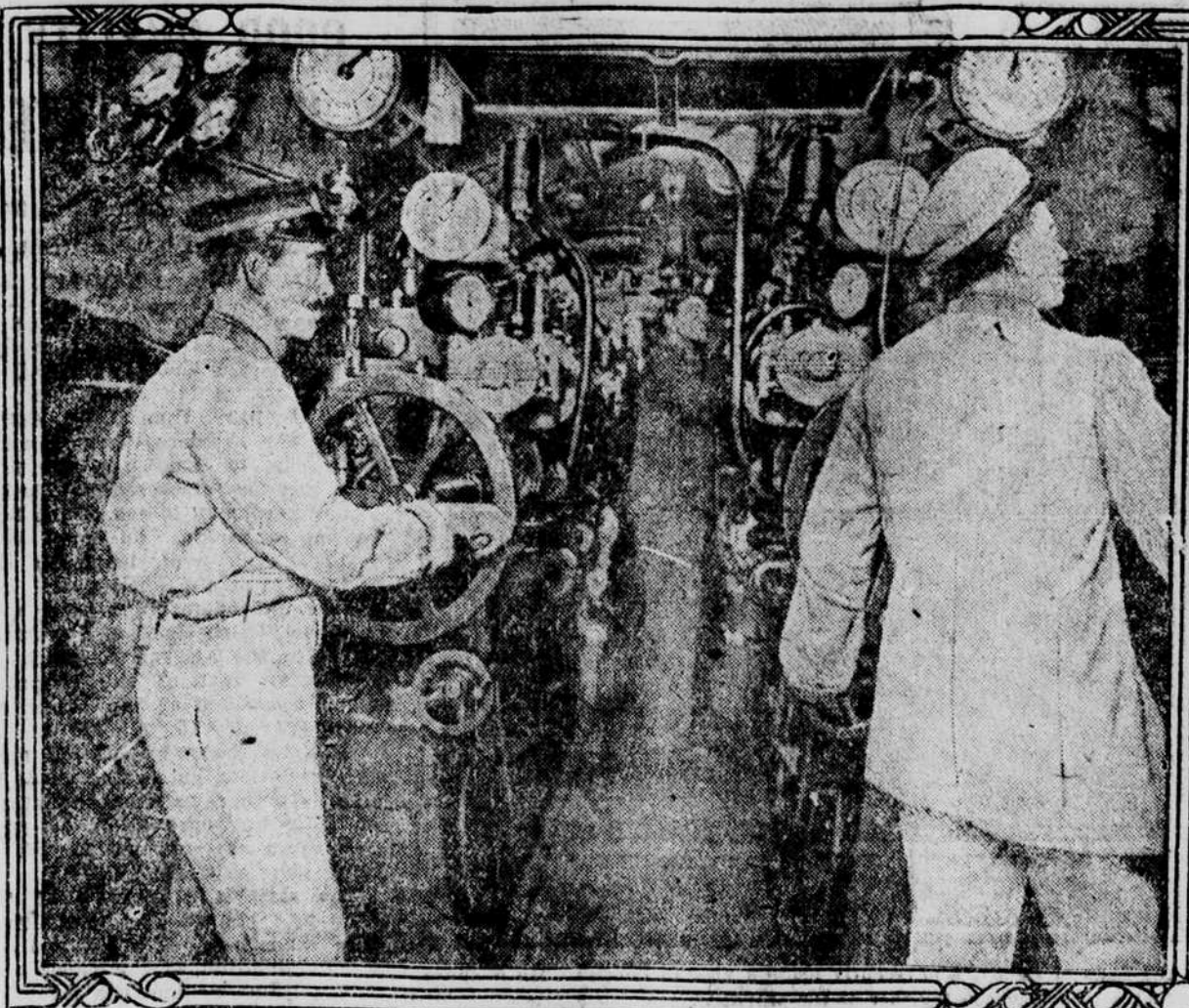

WATER POWER PERMIT  
WANTED IN KANTISHNA  
BY FAIRBANKS MINERS

Application has been made by the Kantishna Hydraulic Mining Company of Fairbanks, for a preliminary water power permit to divert the waters of McKinley Fork, one of the streams at the headwaters of the Kantishna River, into Wonder Lake, to build a dam at the outlet of the lake and to conduct it to a power house at the confluence of El Dorado and Moose creeks in the heart of the Kantishna mining district, according to advice received from the Federal Water Power Commission. This is the first permit sought in Interior Alaska under the water leasing act.

The organizers and stockholders of the above company are Dr. James A. Sutherland, Carl S. Seiberg, and Sylvester Howell, all of Fairbanks. Mr. Howell is one of the most prominent and successful mining operators in the interior. The company owns and controls a large area of placer mining ground on Moose and Eureka creeks in the Kantishna where it is planned to put in a large hydraulic plant next season.

EASTERN CLUBS  
PREPARING NEW  
GAME MEASURE

Will Make Effort to Get  
Alaska Game Law Through  
Next Term of Congress.

That there will be an effort made by Eastern interests to have a game law for Alaska passed at the next session of Congress is indicated in correspondence received recently by Gov. Thomas Riggs, from Washington. Eastern protectionist game clubs and conservationists, it is stated in a letter from Dr. E. W. Nelson, Chief of the Biological Survey, are at this time at work preparing what they consider an ideal game measure for Alaska.

As the measure has not been completed, it is impossible to give any idea of all its provisions, but it is stated that it will include a provision for the sale of certain game in Interior Alaska and one for the removal of the protection on the brown bear. Dr. Nelson states that he believes that the measure will prove to be acceptable to the people of Alaska.

It is the opinion of most Alaskans, however, and especially those who have taken an active interest in matters pertaining to game legislation, that the people of the Territory should be allowed to have a deciding voice in any new measure passed controlling the game situation in the Territory. This view has been repeatedly voiced by Gov. Riggs, President Isaac Sowerby, Secretary Charles D. Garfield and other members of the Alaska Fish and Game Club. These men hold that even with the best possible intentions and the greatest good will, Eastern sportsmen who are interested themselves in the matter lack the definite knowledge of Alaskan conditions having a direct bearing on the situation which is necessary for intelligent action thereon.

Gov. Riggs said today that the Alaska Fish and Game Club's special committee recently appointed to prepare the final draft of a game bill for presentation to Congress through the Territorial Legislature has practically completed its work and will be ready to offer a complete measure to the club within a few days. The fact that Eastern clubs are also preparing a measure dealing with the question, he said, will not have any effect on the Alaska Club's policy. The bill will be presented by the Alaska Fish and Game Club at the coming session of the Territorial Legislature.
