Newspaper Flourish
In Swiss Republic

BERLIN, May 20.—The United States leads the world in the number of newspapers published within its borders, 30,000, according to the newspaper Germania. France is second with 10,000.

The figures, however, tell a different story when the newspapers are compared to the number of inhabitants. On this basis Switzerland stands first with 270 newspapers for every million inhabitants, and the United States is second with 250. In England the proportion is 98 papers to each million people.

AUTHORIZE ARMY
TEAMS TO SHOOT
FOR 1925 TITLE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 20.—The national rifle matches for 1925 are already engaging the attention of the army. War Department instructions just received authorize teams from the infantry, cavalry, coast artillery and engineer branches of the service for the 1925 national matches.

Teams will be composed of one team captain, one team supply officer, one team coach, one team supply and mess sergeant, and 25 firing members, including such pistol firing members as the chief of branch may designate.

All Branches Complete
Preliminary tryouts of groups of forty, including officers, warrant officers and enlisted men, whom each chief of branch may select, will be held at various localities during the last week in May, or early in June, to determine the membership of the teams for the national matches. The teams will include personnel in the United States, in Porto Rico, the Hawaiian department and the Panama Canal department.

Reservists May Shoot
Enlisted army reservists may be attached upon application to the corps area commander by their unit commanders to organizations of the regular army of national guard for firing the rifle and pistol courses in the regular annual target practice under new War Department regulations recently received at the ninth corps area headquarters.

CAN'T BRIBE ATHLETES;
IT'S AGAINST THE LAW

HARRISBURG, Pa., May 20.—Governor Pinchot has signed the Wilkins bill, making it a misdemeanor to bribe or attempt to bribe professional baseball and football players, boxers and wrestlers. A fine of \$5,000 and imprisonment for five years is provided as a penalty.

There is a separate penalty of \$2,000 and imprisonment for three years for any person convicted of attempting to bribe a professional athlete. Other penalty is applicable only to the athlete.

The bill is the aftermath of the scandal that grew out of the alleged attempt to bribe "Heinie" Sand of Philadelphia Nationals last year, resulting in the ousting of Jimmy O'Connell and Cosy Dolan.

The "perfect girl," Miss Gertrude Artelt, of Philadelphia, former national swimming champion, will be married to William H. Degumoen, member of the New York Cotton Exchange. It was announced recently. In 1921, Miss Artelt was chosen as the "most perfect" of 2,000 girls in a Chicago contest.

First Casualty in Rum War

The first capture in the new war on Rum Row, conducted by the greatest Coast Guard fleet ever assembled, was this boat, called the "fastest rum-runner." She was taken ashore at Parkertown, N. J., and, loaded by Coast Guards, after a number of cases of liquor were unloaded. Shortly afterwards, a man, who said he was a part owner, strolled up, suddenly opened the gasoline cocks, and threw in his cigar butt, with the resulting explosion snapped in the unusual photo above. He escaped after saying he would rather destroy the \$35,000 boat than have it used in the anti-rum patrol.
