Opening of the Second Week of the Term.

The opening of the second week is most gratifying to the officers and mauagers. About fourteen teachers were added to the roll of last week. All members of the faculty appear fresh and vig-orous. Every thing points to another most excellent week's work. The county superintendent who is secretary of the Normal says that he was highly rejoiced last Friday evening to hear Dr. Shepherd say that the students of the Asheville Normal are the most appreciative and capable body of teachers that it has been his pleasure to meet in the State. We are always proud of the people of Western North Carolina. We take especial pride in recording to the credit of our teachers (most of whom are teachers of country public schools) the high com-mendation of this scholarly gentleman. In the Normal last week Dr. Shepherd

outlined concisely the work of his department, the English Language and Literature, with History. He assured the teachers t at his earnest wish was to render them a . l possible aid, and express ed the hope that they would not regard him or treat him as a stranger.
