**THE ASHEVILLE NORMAL.**

**Opening of the Second Week of the Term.**

The opening of the second week is most gratifying to the officers and managers. About fourteen teachers were added to the roll of last week. All members of the faculty appear fresh and vigorous. Every thing points to another most excellent week's work. The county superintendent who is secretary of the Normal says that he was highly rejoiced last Friday evening to hear Dr. Sherrill say that the students of the Asheville Normal are the most appreciative and capable body of teachers that he has seen in his career. He said that he was always proud of the people of Western North Carolina. We take especial pride in recording to the credit of our teachers (most of whom are teachers of country public schools) the high commendation of this scholarly gentleman. In the Normal last week Dr. Sherrill outlined concisely the work of his department, the English Language and Literature, with History. He assured the teachers that at his earnest wish was to render them a possible aid, and expressed the hope that they would not regard him or treat him as a stranger. He then proceeded to explain some of the fundamental laws of teaching, dwelling especially upon coordination and its practical value to the student, as well as the instructor. He emphasized the fact that it is not the end of skillful or scientific teaching, to exhaust a topic, but to present it, as to create an interest, to stimulate mental activity, and not to elaborate it to such an extent as to overtax the capacity of the pupil. He then explained the relation of literature to history, showing how admirably they interpret and elucidate each other. Tennyson's "Dreams of Fair Women" was cited in illustration of this general proposition, and the historical allusions contained in it were pointed out, such as, for instance, as the touching reference to Sir Thomas More's daughter and to Joan of Arc. The foundation of the English colonies in America was also discussed, especially the splendid achievements of Sir Walter Raleigh, to whose inspiration the supremacy of the English language and race, in America, is principally to be attributed. The character of the Elizabethan era was also considered, and it was shown that the establishment of the English language upon this continent began at a time coincident with the most brilliant developments of that language, the age of Spenser, Sir Philip Sidney, Sir Francis Bacon, John Shakespeare and a goodly company of others. Spenser's Fairy Queen was also cited as a conspicuous example of an historic poem, one in which the inner consciousness of a great epoch is portrayed with consummate artistic skill and grace.

**Sewerage in Other Places.**

Raleigh is stirring itself on important subject of sewerage. It is time. A population of 15,000, with a city of comparatively level topography, needs some artificial aids to the force of nature to keep it clean and healthy. The Mayor of the city in his recent annual reports and message makes the following recommendations:

"The Mayor recommends that the next legislature be asked to allow the city to vote on a proposition to issue \$70,000 of bonds, bearing interest of eight per cent, running thirty years, for the purpose of constructing a complete system of sewerage; he also asks that authority be given to vote on a proposition to issue \$30,000 of bonds of a similar character for paving purposes."

Raleigh does not claim to be a health resort, but it does claim to maintain its character as a healthy city. With far less at stake than Asheville, it proposes to adopt the system which is before the people of Asheville to-day for adoption or rejection. Let the people consider the momentous issues involved in the question—by adoption of the system, health assured, confidence restored and an unbroken current of prosperity; by its rejection, health jeopardized, confidence lost, the malice of rivals gratified, and the diversion of the stream of fortune to other channels.
