# Mining Notes.

Mr. Ed. G. Peck, Supt. of the celebrated mine of that name. informs us that the proposed sale fell through, owing to the hard times among mining men in San Francisco. They were willing and anxious to pay the \$400 000, but ent. could not raise the money. His company own the Aztlan mill near Prescott, and will now move it over to the mine. They have been paying \$100 per ton for transporting their ore from the mine to the present site of the mill. Hitherto they have sent nothing to mill that assayed less than \$400 per ton. They have thousands of tons accumulated on the dumps that will pay handsomely to crush near the mine. Their present ore body has been opened for a length of 680 feet along the vein and to a depth of 300 feet. The Black Warrior is reported to have high grade milling ore of six feet width. The Black Warrior mill, lying at Ehrenberg, has been bought by M. Masterson and others for the Goodwin mine, and will go forward at once.
