## THE PROGRESS OF RECONSTRUCTION.

Moderation, wisdom, and a surprising degree of toleration and liberality of sentiment characterize the proceedings of the Constitutional Conventions now being held at the South. A peculiar feature of the proceedings is the evident determination to secure a full equality before the law to all men. What ever violence, whatever chicanery and wire working may be going on around, without and in the lobby and committee rooms of these Conventions, the results which appear upon the surface are singularly calm, fair and impartial. In the greater number of instances, negro votes caused the selection of the delegates; and the admirable bearing and high capability of the men selected is one of the best possible proofs of the fitness of the freedmen to exercise the right of suffrage. The new Constitution which is being prepared for the State of Louisiana would seem to be carefully devised, so far as its provisions have been agreed upon. "Equal and exact justice" seems to be the motto adopted by the Republicans, white and black who are in the majority in these Conventions; and while they are determined to be placed upon a footing with their neighbors, so far as the operation of the laws is concerned, the blacks have evinced a disposition to accord a full share of the benefits of the reconstructed governments even to the most offensive classes of the lately dominant race. Judging from the standpoint afforded to us, reconstruction is going on with celerity and success. Once a State of "the Confederacy" is admitted, there will be no trouble about the remainder. The "Chivs" have a tremendous horror of being left out in the cold.

### BY STATE TELEGRAPH

[From the Virginia Enterprise of Sunday.]

ALBANY, January 3.—At a meeting of Peter Caggar and other prominent Democrats, an effort was made to induce Horatio Seymour to consent to become a candidate for the Presidency. It is believed he will consent.

PROVIDENCE, January 3.—Sylvester G. Sherman, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, died suddenly to-day.

WASHINGTON, January 3.—Official Cretan accounts say that in a battle fought on November 25 and 26, the Turks were defeated and forced to retire from their position. The position of the Sultan's Grand Vizier in Candia becomes daily more critical.

NEW ORLEANS, January 3.—Special Orders of January 2 recites that His Excellency B. F. Flanders, Governor of Louisiana, having resigned, Johnson Baker is hereby appointed to fill the vacancy. The same order assigns General R. C. Buchanan to command the District of Louisiana. He is now Assistant Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau.

The Times says the new Governor is a native of Kentucky but an old citizen of Louisiana. He was a member of the Philadelphia Convention and is fully qualified to take the oath.

NEW ORLEANS, January 3.—The Convention has adopted an Article that all persons shall enjoy equal rights in traveling in any public conveyance to all places where business calls them, and that under any license or charter any conveyance shall be deemed a place of public character and open to the accommodation of all persons without regard to race or color.

RICHMOND, January 3.—The Convention has adopted a resolution urging a continuance of the Freedmen's Bureau.

Senator Pomeroy addressed a meeting to-night and advised the Convention to confer the right of suffrage on all males over 21, and secure it to them forever.

### FROM EUROPE.

[BY CABLE.]

BRUSSELS, January 3.—Le Nord has received news from Paris that the headquarters of the Fenian Brotherhood on the continent has been discovered in the Faubourg du Temple, Paris, and were seized by the French police. A large quantity of letters and other documents, reviewing the plans of the organization, and a list of the Headquarters of the Brotherhood were found on the premises. These have been forwarded by the French authorities to London. The account also states that among the documents was one containing the details of a plot for destroying a portion of the British Channel Fleet by fire. Other papers of a similar character discovered have been placed in the hands of the British Government.

LONDON, January 3.—The examination of the prisoners charged with complicity in the Clerkenwell explosion failed to elicit anything satisfactory. The affair is still a mystery. The military in Ireland have been distributed to meet a possible outbreak, and extra vigilance is used in the counties of Cork and Tipperary.

FLORENCE, January 3.—Menebrea has not

succeeded in completing a new Cabinet. The ministerial crisis still continues. Meanwhile political agitation is increasing.

Lisbon, January 3.—Tumults have broken out in the city and other parts of Portugal in consequence of the imposition of taxes. The unpopularity of the new system created in and attempt to carry it into effect, has caused the resignation of the Ministry.

PARIS, January 3.—It is now generally conceded that all hopes of a general conference on the Roman question has been abandoned.

LONDON, January 3.—It is thought that the recent conference on the Eastern question at St. Petersburg by the leading diplomats of Russia has a warlike significance.

### SAN FRANCISCO DISPATCH

[From the Virginia Enterprise of Sunday.]

SAN FRANCISCO January 4.—Charles Walcott Brooks of this city has received his commission as Consul for Japan in this city. This is the first instance of this kind on record in the history of Japan, and is a favorable augury for our future intercourse with that nation.

The funeral to-day of the late Commodore Watkins was attended by a great number of people. Flags on the shipping and in the city were at half-mast.

C. T. Meader of Stockton has filed a petition in insolvency. Liabilities about \$1,600,000, of which he owes \$650,000 to Glidden & Williams of Boston; \$100,000 to Meader & Swan of Boston; \$185,000 to Thomas Hardy of Calaveras; \$50,000 to Thomas Price; \$40,000 to J. B. Meader, and \$24,000 to the Bank of California. Assets about \$40,000, besides 595 shares in the Union Copper Mine at Coppeopolis, valued at \$5,000 per share, and 1,518 shares in the Newton, valued at \$2,000. Total, \$408,000.

The sailing of the Golden City has been postponed until the 11th instant.

The San Jacinto Tin Co., with a capital of \$4,000,000, has been incorporated, to mine in San Bernardino county.

A Frenchman named Henry Bernard died suddenly last night.

Mining stocks closed weak to-day, at the following quotations, Crown Point, \$680; Gould & Curry, \$350; Hale & Norcross, \$1,375; Ophir, \$55; Yellow Jacket, \$730; Belcher, per share, \$130; Kentucky, \$255; Overman, \$83; Savage, \$109.

Flour—The shipment to New York by the steamer Nevada, this afternoon, was 6,330 barrels, valued at \$41,313. The rate of freight charged was \$2 per barrel. The trade is quiet.

Wheat—Quiet, at \$2 60@2 65 for good shipping; extra choice is held higher. The stock at present in the city and in course of shipment is about 350,000 sacks. At the close, 5,000 sacks good shipping were sold yesterday, for New York, on private terms.

Barley—Sale of 500 sacks brewing at \$1 82½. We quote the market at \$1 80@1 90 per 100 pounds. Weak at the outside. Oats—Quotable at \$1 70@1 85 extremes, with \$1 80@1 85 for good to choice. The receipts of wheat at this port for the week ending last Tuesday noon, were 41,820 sacks, and of flour 14,690 quarter sacks, against 18,480 sacks of wheat and 6,220 quarter sacks of flour for the corresponding week last year.

Gold closed in New York, to-day, at \$1 34.
