EURERA CONSOLIDATED OFFI- PACIFIC COAST.

Following is the official letter of Superintendent Donnelly to the San Francisco office of the company, forwarded on Saturday last:

Work at the mine has continued with the usual progress and most en-couraging results. The ore bodies, couraging results. The ore bodies, from top to bottom, are all looking well, and yielding their usual quota of ore. The ore seam recently discovered on the eighth level, and mentioned in a previous letter, has developed into a body of very good ore, and is looking first rate, with good prospects of turning out to be a large deposit, though, at this writing, it is impossible to form any adequate idea of its dimensions, as sufficient work has not been done to determine a correct theory of it. This body of ore lies has not been done to determine a cor-rect theory of it. This body of ore lies about midway of the mine, and was found in a drift running north from the main drift when in a distance of 100 the main drift when in a distance of 100 feet. This portion of the mine is entirely unexplored, and from the recent developments on the eighth level, would indicate that within this large area of ground is to be found a belt or ore channel, containing unlimited resources extending up and down an unknown distance. In all probability we are on the eve of making important developments that will materially enhance the value of the mme, and place it in the highest rank of the productive mines on the Coast. Judging this theory to be correct, I have started drifts from the fifth and seventh levels, running north, to explore the ground above the ore body on the eighth level, and have also started a drift from the ninth level, running in the same general course, to determine the same general course, to running in the same general course, to determine whether this ore body may not be found extending below.
