The telegraph the other day mentioned  
a banquet given to John McCullough by  
distinguished gentlemen in Washington.  
The Sacramento Bee, commenting on the

not helped him in the slightest in the pub-  
lic admiration, and his starting trips are  
growing less and less profitable. Pen and

thinking of when they allowed themselves  
to be roped into such a pinch-neck per-

### DIPHTHERIA IN EUROPE.

Diphtheria is reported in our dispatches  
as prevalent in Europe, and details appear  
in English journals of the illness of nearly  
the whole family of the Grand Duke of  
Hesse, whose wife is Princess Alice, daughter  
of Queen Victoria. The Grand Duke  
himself, his son and four of his five daugh-  
ters were all afflicted with the disease, and  
the youngest child, Mary, four years old  
next May, died of it. The death of Princess  
Alice has been announced. In printing  
these facts, and enlarging upon the preva-  
lence of diphtheria and its obscure char-  
acter, the London Times says that early  
in the present year it manifested itself as  
an epidemic of considerable severity in the  
north of London, leading to the formation  
of a committee to investigate the general  
sanitary condition of that locality, one of  
the discoveries being that nearly all the  
houses in the district affected were open to  
the invasion of sewer gas.

THERE is much talk in the press of the  
opposition to the effect that Senator Thur-  
man, in the late canvass in Ohio, changed  
front on the finance question. He did not  
nothing of the kind. He denounced the  
inflation heresy, and contended that hard  
money is, and should be, the money of the  
country. What he did say was that the  
National banks should be abolished and the  
Government issue its notes direct. There  
is no sane man who will attempt to con-  
troversy the correctness of the Senator's  
views on this question.

THE London Court Journal asks: "What  
will be thought of the United States ship-  
ping plum pudding to England, potatoes  
to Ireland, oatmeal to Scotland, toys to  
Nuremberg, and lager beer to Germany?  
Yet such are the facts, and they are no  
more astonishing than the now three-fold  
sale of the regular and profitable sale of  
American cotton goods in Manchester, and  
American cutlery and hardware in Bir-  
mingham."

TRANSATLANTIC travel has practically  
closed for 1878, after a prosperous season.  
While the different lines have had neither  
the passengers nor freight they carried  
previous to the panic of 1873, the Paris  
Exhibition increased the homeward bound  
cabin passengers from 23,473 in 1877 to  
26,837, and heavier immigration pushed up  
the steerage arrivals from 56,300 to 70,800.

SOME idea of the grain producing capa-  
city of the Western States can be formed  
from the fact that the Chicago elevators  
now contain 6,288,942 bushels. Of this  
amount 4,064,299 bushels are wheat, 892-  
295 corn, 229,263 oats, 139,116 rye, and  
1,263,967 barley.

SENATOR CONKLING is said to have pro-  
nounced unequivocally for General Grant  
for a third term. If so, this settles it.  
Conklings was the only man who stood in  
his way.
