New York, May 10.

Captain W. H. Dall, now of the Coast Survey, writes a long review of the Alaska situation. He sums up the wants of Eastern Alaska thus: Two suitable cruisers more or less constantly in motion; the instant punishment of violence on the part of the Indians by the destruction of their houses and canoes, the surrender of the really guilty being the only alternative; a circuit judge to hear and decide ordinary civil and police cases; an officer who might be termed Governor, who should reside at Wrangle or Sitka, and make the rounds of the Territory once a year on a cruiser, and should have a Russian speaking Secretary authorized to record land titles for actual settlers and annual reports to the Navy Department and Congress.

The "Herald" adds: We quite agree with Captain Dall that an ordinary Territorial Government would be impracticable. It is the judgment of all who have disinterestedly studied the subject that law for white settlers is quite as needful as force to control the Indians.

Chicago, May 10.

The "Tritune" has a long editorial on California's new Constitution. It says the instrument has many admirable and reformatory provisions. The Convention which framed the Constitution seemed to be possessed by the idea that labor is to be enriched and elevated by the expulsion or confiscation of money used as a wages fund to employ labor and increase production. With regard to these provisions of the revenue clauses of the new Constitution, it may be said, however, that they will prove less harmful than they were expected to be. Several of them are to be found in the Constitution of this and other States, but, while they exist as a menace, they have practically and universally proved abortive.
