There will be four contacts of the circular disks or limbs of the sun and planet, namely a first external contact of the limbs, and then, after an interval of about twenty-one minutes of time, the second contact, or first internal contact will take place. After an interval of about six hours the third contact or secend internal contact will take place, and about twenty-one minutes after the third, the fourth contact or second external contact, will complete the transit.
