Spit Lake, Nov. 16.—There was quite an excitement to-day, upon the report of New York lapidaries, now here, that among the samples of precious stones brought to this city this week by J. F. Berry, are 26 diamonds.

Berry declares his readiness to pilot a party to the location of the discovery and state everything, and says that they too can find diamonds. He says it is where Janin went, and the report he made is true.

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—The fire last night destroyed a small frame house, on Page street, belonging to James Casey. Loss \$700.

T. R. Ryan has been appointed Collector of forfeited criminal bail bonds. He will commence work at once.

It is reported that the location of the Lint & Harpending Diamond Fields Co. is near the boundary line between Colorado, Wyoming and Utah.

Considerable interest is felt about the alleged diamond discoveries in Butte Co. A few specimens from that section are in possession of Treadwell.

The examination of Lee, Stone, Fern, and Mrs. Edwards, will be resumed in the Police Court this afternoon.

Stone got bail. The question, who helped the forgers to escape and who sold them out, is perplexing. Sheriff Adams will not tell who gave him the first information, but it is generally believed that Stone was the man.

None of the Wharfingers removed by the Harbor Commissioners have left the city, but as the Board suspended them, its authority to compel their attendance ceased.

None of them have been arrested, and the course which the Grand Jury and the authorities will take remains a secret.

Many anxious inquiries are made at the Merchants' Exchange and the newspaper offices for intelligence of the overdue steamer Arizona.

The steamer Japan, on her voyage here, encountered several severe gales, and was twice obliged to lay to. On one occasion a heavy sea struck the vessel and stove her bulwarks forward, and damaged the deck house.

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—A meeting of the members of the press and friends of the late Col. A. S. Evans was held at 4 p. m. to-day, in the 15th District Court room.

St. Louis, Nov. 16.—The Democrat this morning states, editorially, that there will be two changes in the Cabinet after the 4th of March.

Memphis, Nov. 16.—The accident on the Little Rock Railway last night was caused by a broken rail. The engineer saw it, but too late to stop the train.

Boston, Nov. 16.—Harvard College suffered \$552,000 loss by the fire here. Including the value of land, it will cost \$500,000 to rebuild.

The fire was rather severe on publishers. The American Home Magazine, Waverly, and all weeklies and monthlies secured new quarters; and, though temporarily incommoded, new type, new presses and hard work will enable them soon to run smoothly.

The disabled steamship Malta is being towed into this port, to await the arrival of her new shaft from New York or Liverpool.

New York, Nov. 16.—The bank statements show a specie increase of \$166,000.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Senators Cameron, Osborn, Spencer, and ex-Senator Wade, were among the callers on the President to-day.

Snow is falling here this afternoon. Petersburg, Nov. 16.—The residence of Nathan Linden, Elton's Station, was burned yesterday morning.

London, Nov. 16.—The ship Sirois was wrecked in the North Sea, in a tremendous gale, on Wednesday last, and 11 of the crew perished.

Petersboro, Ont., Nov. 16.—A horrible murder was committed in the Township of Dumfries, near the head of Stony Lake.

Copenhagen, Nov. 16.—The storm which raged in the north of Europe on Wednesday, was very disastrous. All through Denmark and on the coast the wind blew a hurricane.

Hull of the town of Frasto, on the Island of Zealand, in the Baltic, was laid waste by the force of the wind; and the small island of Bottey was entirely submerged, and all the inhabitants drowned.

Nearly all the cattle on the islands are drowned, the wells are flooded from the sea, and the inhabitants are suffering from want of fresh water, food and shelter.

The Government dispatched a steamer laden with supplies to their relief.

The Island of Rugwalso felt the disaster heavily, many of its fishing boats being destroyed and its fields near the coast line flooded.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—Bismarck is recovering.

Madrid, Nov. 16.—The Court Physicians issued a bulletin this morning, stating that King Amadeus passed a bad night.

London, Nov. 16.—A dispatch from Sirsant to-day reports 80 vessels totally wrecked in the late gale, and the town considerably damaged by inundation.

The fishermen on the Island of Cingst Dars and Hiddensol lost all their fishing smacks and apparatus, and their houses and contents were greatly damaged by water.
