TERRITORIAL REPUBLICAN TICKET.

For Delegate to Congress, **GRANVILLE G. BENNETT.**

JUDICIAL DISTRICT TICKET.

For District Attorney, 2d Judicial District, **Alfred M. Flagg,** Of Minnehaha County.

REPUBLICAN NOMINATIONS.

The republican convention called for the nomination of a candidate for congress has completed its work and its members have dispersed to their homes. The convention was the largest ever assembled in Dakota and embraced within its ranks the best representative men the territory possesses. As a result of its work it has given to the republican party of Dakota a candidate in the person of G. G. Bennett, associate justice of the supreme court and judge of the first judicial district of Dakota, comprising the Black Hills country. Judge Kidder, our present delegate, made a strong run for re-nomination and lacked only a few votes of carrying off the prize. His supporters stood by him till the last, and the only reason he failed to succeed was that a majority of the convention preferred some other man to him. This is the inevitable conclusion. Col. Moody, of Yankton, was a prominent candidate before the convention for the honor of its choice and made a strong run. While we accord to all the gentlemen whose names were voted upon in the convention the full measure of merit to which each is entitled, we are free to say that we believe the success of Judge Bennett will bring to the party of the entire territory the best of results. Our candidate is a man upon whom all can unite. He stands before the people as one against whom not one word of reproach can be uttered. He is a true republican and an able man. He stands preeminent as the representative of the best elements of our people. His career as a judge in our territory has brought him into contact with many of our people and wherever he is personally known he has developed his greatest popular strength. The choice of the convention was a wise choice and one which will result in a sweeping victory at next November's election.

For the position of district attorney for the second judicial district of Dakota the convention decided upon Alfred M Flagg, of Minnehaha county. He is a rising young man - one who has cast his lot with the rest of us and who is gradually winning his way to popular favor. Mr. Flagg is unanimously indorsed by the people of his own county and that is a sufficient recommendation for him.

BLACK HILLS NOTES.

Judge Kuykendall has been chosen chairman of the democratic committee of Lawrence county, in place of Dr. Meyers, resigned.

Charles Scott, who has the contract for making the government surveys in the Black Hills, has arrived at Deadwood. His contract aggregates \$47,750.

The military have seized a number of horses in Deadwood bearing the U. S. brand.

A special dispatch to the Chicago Times says: William G. Hollins, formerly of Omaha, but latterly of Deadwood, telegraphs from Fort Custer, Montana, under date of August 18, that the greatest discovery of gold ever known has been made on the north fork of the Stinking Water river, two hundred and fifty miles from Custer. He has just come from the diggings for supplies. Three men only have been at work in the gulch less than four months, and have taken out over three hundred pounds of gold, using a hollow log for a sluice-box. It is known as the Whitmore discovery. A grand stampede thither is expected.

Mrs. Collison, recently murdered at Deadwood, taught the first school in that city. Her husband is a miner at Rockville. "Gen." Shields, a notorious negro, who was mixed up in the Gay-Forbes tragedy, has been arrested on suspicion of being the murderer.
