COLONEL BRACKETT'S CONGRATULATIONS.

Col. A. G. Brackett, commanding the dis-
trict of the Yellowstone, with headquarters
at Fort Custer, Montana, has issued an or-
der commendatory of the bravery and en-
durance of his troops. The order is as
follows:

The district commander takes pleasure
in announcing to the troops serving in the
district, the successful results of the efforts
made to capture and destroy the hostile
Cheyennes under Little Wolf. These In-
dians, after committing many depredations
and atrocities, entered this district from the
south, at a time of the year when campaign-
ing seemed almost impossible; nevertheless
the commands sent in February under
Capt. Snyder, 5th infantry (consisting of
Companies A and F 5th infantry and com-
pany A 2d cavalry), and Lieut. Clark, com-
prising companies E and I 2d cavalry, and
detachment 5th infantry, bore the hardships
of field service with becoming fortitude
and determination. Notwithstanding the
almost impassable streams, deep snows,
short rations, and the rigors of winter, the
hiding place of the hostiles was discovered
by the Indian scouts serving with Lieut.
Clark, who, with rare judgment and energy
immediately started after them and succeed-
ed on the 25th inst., in capturing the entire
village, consisting of about thirty lodges
and two hundred and fifty horses.

The savages under Little Wolf, are now
in the power of the government, unable to
continue their raids on the settlements of
the valleys or to join their more successful
allies, the northern Sioux. The district
commander thanks Lieut. Clark and King-
bury and companies E and I 2d cavalry, and
Lieut. Tillson and the detachment of the
5th infantry, for the excellent service done.
He also expresses his acknowledgments to
Capt. Snyder and Casey, 5th infantry, and
Lieut. Pearson, 2d cavalry, and their re-
spective companies, for the zeal and energy
displayed by them in operating from a more
distant locality, and having in common
with Lieut. Clark's command, the object of
intercepting Little Wolf and his band.

Mr. Keiser and the Crow Indian scouts
sent from this post are also deserving of
mention for their perseverance in traversing
the country to the east and south.

AGRICULTURAL HORSES.

At the February meeting of the Tervio-
dale farmers' club, Mr. Thomas Brown,
Elmhurst, in introducing the question of
the "Most profitable and useful breed of
horses for agriculture in this district," said:
"For many years Clydesdale horses have
been mostly used in this and other coun-
tries, and have been very profitable to
breeders, as many of them have been sold
at very high prices. With few exceptions
they have brought more money than any
other breed in the world. I think it is a
great mistake in many farmers trying to
breed from old wrought out mares, useless
for anything else, and often too old for that
purpose. By using young sound mares you
have a better prospect of getting more val-
uable horses. I, therefore, think that
breeding first class Clydesdale horses for
sale is the most profitable course; but for
usefulness I consider smooth legged horses,
with strength and a little breeding, will
stand more fatigue, be as easy kept, and not
so liable to lameness from cracked heels,
grease, etc., and can be bought at a much
lower price than Clydesdale. I had a
good deal of experience in driving, and al-
ways found the best bred could always go
to the longest journey; the same in hunt-
ing. Forty years ago it was a rare sight to
see a thoroughbred in the hunting field.
Now you will seldom see a half-bred.
Some years ago you had some chance of
winning a hunter's stake with a half-bred,
but now you require a thoroughbred to
win even a small stake—London Live
Stock Journal.

MONTANA INDIANS.

Helena, Montana, April 22.—The bodies
of five Uncaspe Sioux were found on the
prairie thirty miles from Benton on the
18th. They are supposed to be raiders
who were discovered and killed by the
Gros Ventres.

The Flathead Indians will not stay on
their reservation, get drunk, and have sev-
eral times attacked white men with rocks.
A man named Kenny, who knocked down
a threatening Indian, was shot and would
have been killed by a score of infuriated
young bucks had not some older chiefs in-
terfered. The company of infantry at Ft.
Missoula seems unable to give the protec-
tion demanded by the settlers, and the
Charles band of unruly redskins needs
severity to keep it within bounds.

On the 19th a party of Indians, probably
Mountain Crows, ran off with ten horses
from Hunter's Springs, on the Yellow-
stone. They were hotly pursued, but ef-
fects their escape with three horses.

Trouble with the British mounted po-
lice has driven the Teton Sioux to this side
of the boundary.
