COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Proceedings of the May Session of the Board.

OFFICE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, YANKTON, D. T., May 20th, 1879.

Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners W. B. Valentine, chairman, and O. S. Sanipson and Daniel Wilcox, also E. Miner clerk.

A report was submitted to the board by T. H. Sampson, county surveyor, of a survey made by him of the division of the county into districts, and a new district 17, to be numbered district 48. A remonstrance was also presented to the board against such division. The board after fully considering the matter, and motion voted to approve the action of said county superintendent, believing the division to be for the best interest of all concerned.

Another report was submitted giving notice of the organization and establishment of the boundaries of school district No. 29 as follows: Said district to comprise the following sections, to-wit: Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26, in township 95, range 54. On motion the report was approved.

Another report was submitted giving notice of the organization of school district No. 33 with boundaries as follows: Commencing at the southeast corner of section 36, township 95, range 54, thence west along township line to the southwest corner of section 33; thence north to the county line, thence east to the county line; thence south on the county line to the place of beginning. On motion the report was approved.

E. H. VanAntwerp, Jacob Brauch and Louis Sampson, the viewers heretofore appointed to view, and if of public utility, locate a certain highway heretofore petitioned for by Herman Ellerman, Frank Huber, Philip Bender, and others, submitted their report stating that they find the said highway to be of public utility and recommend that the same be established as described in said report, and no legal objection having been made or remonstrance filed, the board on motion, voted to adopt the report of the viewers; that the said highway be located sixty-six feet wide and a record thereof be made, and that said highway be opened and kept in repair, and that proper notice thereof be given to the road supervisors to work the said highway.

E. H. VanAntwerp, county surveyor, submitted a report, accompanied by the field notes of a proposed highway running from the north boundary of section 5, township 95, range 57, on the county line, southerly, to a point on the county road in section 29, township 95, range 56, south 26 degrees, 45 minutes west from station 62, and the right of way having been given by all the owners of the lands through which it passes, the board, on motion, voted to establish the same as a public highway.

A report was submitted by E. H. VanAntwerp, county surveyor, accompanied by the field notes of a proposed road running from station 48 on county road in section 33 township 95, range 56, to the county road running north and south on or near the range line between townships 95, ranges 55 and 56, at station 18, in section 13, town 95, range 56; and the right of way having been given by the owners of all lands through which it passes, the board, on motion, voted to establish the same as a public highway.

The bonds of H. A. Harvey and Charles Roth, on application for county liquor license, were, on motion approved, and the clerk instructed to issue the licenses.

In conformity to section 16 of the act passed at the recent session of the legislature establishing the Dakota Hospital for the insane, the board proceeded to appoint a board of commissioners of insanity, and on motion, the following persons were appointed:

Chairman—L. Congleton, judge of probate; Dr. J. M. Miller, for two years from the date of approval of the above act, and E. G. Smith for one year from the date of approval of the above act.

A petition was presented by Mrs. L. M. Whitaker asking that the taxes and penalty due on lot 7 and south 8 feet of lot 6, in block 45 of Lower Yankton, be remitted, she being unable to pay the same.

On motion, the prayer of the petitioner was granted.

JUDGE COLE AND THE IOWA CENTRAL.

Des Moines, May 20.—In the Cole disbarment the counsel for Cole filed a demurrer to the charges against him on the ground that the letters for the writing of which he is sought to be disbarred, were privileged by his client and himself, and generally that the charges are not sufficient ground for disbarment. To-day was set for the trial, but nothing was done, the time of the court being occupied with settling the final decree in the Central railroad of Iowa case, out of which the proceedings against Cole arose. To-morrow argument on the demurrer will be had. Messrs. Cook, Clark and Springer will, it is said, make argument for the prosecution, and Mr. Lehman and Judge Cole himself for the defense.

The Central railroad of Iowa to-day passed out of the hands of the receiver and by order of the United States court is to be turned over to the new company, which has been incorporated under the title of the Central Iowa railway. The court approved of the incorporation to-day and, as stated, the new organization takes into power through the decision of the suit of the Farmers' loan and trust company vs. the Central railroad of Iowa to foreclose the mortgage on the road, which suit was decided this evening, the new company to pay all outstanding claims against the receiver that are now disputed within twelve months at seven per cent interest. The contested claims pending in the court are referred to the new company for adjustment and settlement. If they fail to do so the parties may come back to the court which retains jurisdiction for this purpose. The directors of the company are: Russell Sage, Edwin Parsons, F. D. Tappan, Geo. Bliss, Jas. Buell, Geo. E. Tinton, A. L. Burdette, Chas. Alexander, E. M. Cate, Henry A. Jones and P. V. Rogers.

COLORED CONVENTION.

Richmond, May 20.—In the colored convention a committee of three was appointed to go to Washington to consult with leading republicans upon the best course to pursue in the efforts to secure emancipation and improvement of the condition of the colored race.

The committee on grievances made their report setting forth at length the wrongs of the colored people and submitting a series of resolutions recommending the colored people of the state to organize societies for the purpose of petitioning the legislative and judicial departments of the state for full recognition of their rights as citizens, and if such rights were not fully accorded that they are advised to emigrate to other states and territories, where there is no distinction on account of color; denying the constitutional power of a state to prohibit marriages on account of color and pledging every effort to have the obnoxious and unconstitutional law wiped out; recommending thorough organization of the colored people for bettering their political, financial and commercial condition, and finally endorsing the efforts of their suffering and oppressed colored brethren of the south to leave the states of oppression and find other homes where their political opinions and rights will be respected.

After some debate the report was adopted with but few negative votes. An executive committee and a committee to prepare an address to the people of Virginia were appointed, and the convention adjourned sine die.

FOREIGN MARKETS.

London, May 20.—The Mark Lane Express says: Reports as to the present aspect of the country, although they are not alarming, are not calculated to afford farmers much satisfaction. The damage already done to wheat is not perhaps extensive. A succession of dry, warm days would go far to relieve the present anxiety. The provincial exchanges almost without exception were dearer at the close last week. English wheat has been marketed freely in the country but sparingly at Mark Lane, and trade in London has been marked by considerable firmness. Foreign wheat has been firmly held; holders in occasional instances obtaining a slight advance. Should the adverse weather continue, a rally may speedily take place, as imports, although on a fairly liberal scale, have not been excessive. Although sales the past week have been chiefly retail, millers have shown more inclination to extend their transactions and a strong feature in trade has been the steady continental demand for cargoes of white wheat from California and Oregon. The stocks are steadily diminishing, as most of the imports have gone direct into millers' hands, and taking all things into consideration, the present position of wheat is a firmer one than it has occupied for many months. There has been very little quotable alteration in the value of spring wheat, but trade has been inanimate.

Wheat is steady, and appearances seem to indicate that the lowest point has been touched.

The sales of English wheat last week were 57,209 quarters at 40s 8d per quarter, against 41,223 quarters at 52s 1d per quarter for the corresponding week of the previous year. The imports into the united kingdom for the week ending May 10 were 992,023 hundred weight of wheat and 189,744 hundred weight of flour.
