## PICTURE DONE

TO FIELD TO BE SHOWN AT WORLD'S FAIR.

Work of Advertising Commission Commenced.—B. D. Sanborn Member of Committee.

Advertising of Weld county as some time ago by Thomas Keiser, secretary of the Denver State exchange and manager of Colorado Press Bureau of Inglewood has now taken definite shape. Together with other sections of the state it will be represented at the World's Fair by moving pictures of the industries of the state. A picture from Weld county is a field with a potato digging machine at work. The picture was taken by H. H. Buckwalter on A. M. Miller's farm. This picture is completed and the following from Mr. Buckwalter to Mr. Keiser: "I hold subject to your order and payment, the motion picture recently made of the potato digging machine in Greeley, Colo. The length of the picture is 110 feet and it is the best as well as quite the most interesting of the entire series. It is fully and with unexpected detail the entire field of handling the famous potatoes."

The picture will within a few days be sent on the road with the other pictures until the Fair begins, when lecturer will be sent to position. In the meantime people will have a chance to see the picture and see the pictures early date, as the lecture will be held here. The cost of the picture was \$100.00, but the full amount was paid by subscription by the following individuals: Sanborn, B. D., First National Bank, National Bank, The Farm Implement company, A. M. Saturday B. D. Sanborn, F. H. P. W. Allen and A. M. Nathan went to Denver to meet delegates from other parts of the state to discuss ways and means of exhibiting Colorado at the World's Fair. The meeting was held in the hotel and the result was the formation of a committee to be known as the Colorado Promotion and Publicity Committee. The committee will again meet in Greeley this afternoon to discuss the business.

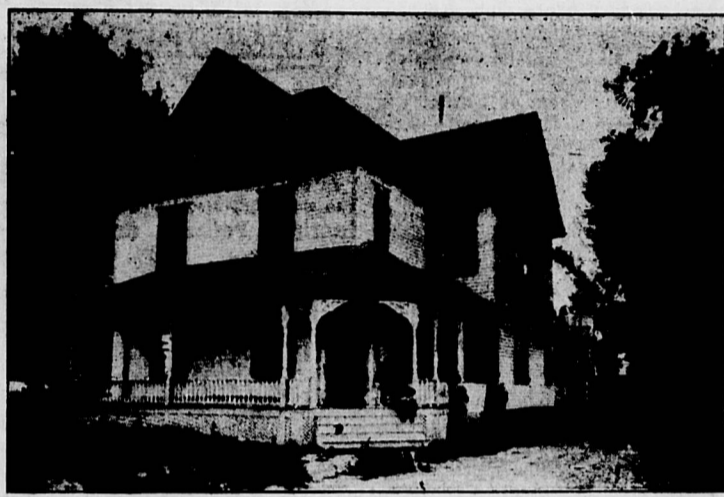
## NEW FIRM

Greeley High Schools Are Crack-a-jacks.

The score at the end of the game stood 32 and 26 in favor of Greeley.

### A Skating Pond.

A number of young men of the town, headed mostly by Alex St. Denis of the postoffice, have clubbed together and raised money enough to repair the old mill pond dam so as to create a skating pond north of the city. The place at present is known as Woodbury's pasture, but Mr. Woodbury has given his consent to have it flooded, and J. L. Ewing, manager of the Model Mills, has given the water from the mill power canal for the flooding. The dam was repaired Thanksgiving day and some water was run into the basin. It will be necessary, however, to dam up the river some at the intake of the canal in order to get water enough. This is being done, or will be done at once, and as soon as there is a heavy enough frost to congeal the water, a skating pond several acres in extent will be ready for the young folks and a few of the older ones as well.
