The October number of Brownson's Quarterly Review, the official quarterly of the Roman Catholics in the United States, contains a most able and patriotic essay on the different questions raised by the pro-slavery rebellion, and in particular on the relations of slavery to the rebellion and to the Union.

Ma. Brownson takes the position that, it we value peace, Lonor, liberty, prosperityall we have or hope for, we must maintain the Union; and he believes that to put down the rehelfion, and bring back a peace which shall be lasting and honorable, as well as righteous, we must not only put down the rebellion, but also that which is the sole cause of the rebellion-slavery.

He thinks rebellion dissolves all laws for the protection of the life or property of the rebels, especially the State laws making property of all classes of men, and that it i perfectly right and proper for the Govern PATENTED IN AMERICA, ment to avail itself of the service of the 1,000,000 negroes who have heretofore been held in bondage in the rebel States. Mr. Brownson, in closing, reviews the subject in its philanthropic and religious aspects, in the following eloquent passage

It seems to us, then, highly important, in every possible view of the case, that the Federal government should avail itself of the opportunity given it by the Southern rebellion to perform this act of justice to the negro race; to assimilate the labor system of the South to that of the North; to remove a great moral and political wrong; and to wipe out the foul stain of slavery, which has hitherto sulfied the otherwise oright escutcheon of our Republic. We are no fanatics on the subject of slavery, as is well known to our readers, and we make no extraordinary pretensions to modern philanthropy; but we cannot help tearing if the government lets slip the present opportunity of doing justice to the negro race, and of placing our republie throughout in harmony with modern civilization, God, who is especially the God of the poor and the oppressed, will never give victory to our arms or suffer us to succeed in our efforts to suppress rebellion, and restore peace and integrity to the Union.

We have too long turned a deaf ear to the cry of the enslaved; we have too long suffered our hearts to grow callous to the wrongs of the down-trodden in our own country; we have too long been willing to grow rich, to erect our palaces, and to gather luxuries around us by the toil, the sweat and the blood of our enslaved brethren.
