Eagle Plant Sets World's Record

Ford Motor Company Completes and Delivers Eighteen Patrol Boats to Government in Twenty-five Days.

The largest number of steel or wooden hulled boats ever completed by one ship yard in one month's time were fully outfitted and turned over to the navy officials by the Ford ship plant at River Rouge (Detroit), Michigan, during the month of September.

As soon as the boats are commissioned by the navy they are dispatched to the New London or Portsmouth navy yards, where they are manned and ordered to join different squadrons of the U. S. fleet.

Forty-eight of these patrol boats have already been accepted by the navy department. The remaining 12 were finished and delivered during the first part of November.

TACOMA WILL BOOST FOR SHIP CANAL TO OCEAN

Council Instructs City Engineer to Attend Hearing on Big Project Here.

Tacoma officials are going to boost for the canal from Olympia to Grays Harbor to give an outlet to the Sound from this section to the south and get away from the stormy straits to the north.

Commissioner Harrison brought the matter to the attention of the Tacoma city council Saturday and the council appointed City Engineer J. C. Manley to be at Olympia December 18 and represent Tacoma in the hearing to be given on the subject by the federal government.

"Maybe they can get this project through now for the benefit of the Grays Harbor country. They have a congressman. Tacoma has no congressman, so we cannot do anything, but they may be able to accomplish something. We certainly are for it," said Mayor Riddell.

TO HELP WITH INSURANCE

H. J. Hoffman to Handle Re-instatement Details for Local Post.

To assist ex-service men to get reinstatement of their war risk insurance, H. J. Hoffman has been appointed by Commander Roscoe M. Fullerton of Alfred William Leach Post No. 3, American Legion, to take charge of the work for the local post.

The action was taken at the request of the state department of the legion, after a conference in Seattle with the war risk insurance officers of the government. Hoffman, who is an ex-service man, is a deputy in the county treasurer's office, and his duties in the work for the present will consist mainly in getting the insurance of the men reinstated.

The post has been notified that applications for reinstatement must be filed with the local officer before the first of the new year.
