New York, Oct. 17th.

Capt. Luce, in a 4th account of the loss of the Arctic-says.—In the first boat that lowered for the purpose of saving the passengers were several Indians.

Therby one of whom Capt. Luce remembers by name is Miss Smith, a daughter of Mr. G. Smith of this city.

Excepting in this boat, no ladies were saved or left the ship.

**Later from Europe.**

**SEBASTAPOL TAKEN!!**

Eighteen Thousand Russians, and Eleven Thousand French and English killed.

New York, Oct. 16th.

Steamer *Belle de Liverpool* fourth inst., arrived at this port about 6 o'clock this evening, her news is very important. A great battle had taken place in the Crimea, in which the Russians were almost totally annihilated. *Ten Ships of War Sunk*. Sebastopol had fallen, and the city was in flames—Ten thousand French and English soldiers had been killed, and 20,000 Russians taken prisoners. One thousand guns had been captured, but Menschikoff with the shattered remains of his army still refused to surrender. On the 21st, the Allies stormed the Russian entrenchments and after four hours hard fighting, carried them. The French and English lost 2800 killed and wounded, while the Russians lost 1000.

Private dispatches supply the further particulars, viz. that the Russians under Menschikoff in person, rallied on the river Katscha, on the 23d, and again gave battle to the Allies. He was again defeated and driven into his entrenchments, behind Sebastopol, when he again rallied and fought a third battle on the 24th, and was a third time utterly defeated. He then fled with the remnant of his troops into Sebastopol, which was besieged by sea and stormed by land.

The Russian fleet in the Harbor of Sebastopol was then burned. Ten ships had sunk. The Russians lost 18,000 men killed and wounded when the garrison of 22,000 men capitulated and were made prisoners.

Menschikoff with the remains of his army then fell back and harried the inner harbor, refusing to surrender. Six hours were allowed him to consider the matter, and it is reported, though not officially, that he surrendered at the expiration of that time.

A great rejoicing had taken place in Great Britain and France on account of these glorious victories.

By way of Vienna the report comes that Menschikoff had surrendered the remainder of his fleet. From Paris it is stated confidently that Gen. Vicom demonstrated to the Emperor the practicability of taking Constanti-nople, and that the attempt will be immediately made. Six Russian ships escaped from Sebastopol. One French and 3 Russian Generals have arrived at Constantinople, wounded.
