TUESDAY OCTOBER, 4, 1910, at one o'clock for the purpose of constructing two bridges and repairing of one. One bridge in Columbia township over Cano creek near Cuzco thirty feet long, with twelve foot legs, concrete backing and wings or concrete abutments, with three inch white oak or concrete floor reinforced with wire mesh the roadway to be twelve feet wide.

One bridge in Ferdinand township near Anthony Drasch; bridge to be fourteen feet long, roadway fourteen feet wide with concrete abutments, nine feet high and eighteen inches thick, four wing walls eight feet long and twelve inches thick.

Repairs of a bridge in Columbia Township across Patoka river at Ben Humberts, repairing to consist of "I" beams and a first class three inch white oak flooring the roadway is twelve feet wide and eighty two feet long.

Contractors must make all fills and complete bridges ready for traffic. Each bid must be accompanied by bond required by law.
