IN SENATE,
SATURDAY, July 31.

Extract from the Executive record, com-
prehending the messages of the Pre-
sident of the United States in relation
to the nomination of Albert Gallatin,
John Q. Adams and James A. Bayard,
as envoys extraordinary and ministers
plenipotentiary to negotiate a treaty of
peace and commerce with the United
Kingdoms of G. Britain and Ireland,
and a treaty of commerce with Rus-
sia; with the proceedings of the Sen-
ate thereon.

On motion by Mr Leib,
Ordered, That there be furnished to
any member applying for the same, an
extract from the executive record, com-
prehending the messages of the Presi-
dent of the United States, in relation to
the nominations of Albert Gallatin, John
Q. Adams and James A. Bayard, as en-
voys extraordinary and ministers pleni-
potentiary to negotiate a treaty of peace
and commerce with the United King-
dom of Great Britain and Ireland, and a
treaty of commerce with Russia, with
the proceedings of the Senate thereon.

On motion by Mr Dana.
Ordered, That the Secretary of the Sen-
ate cause the extract which may be fur-
nished from the executive record, as be-
fore mentioned, to be printed for the use
of members who may request the same.

EXTRACT, &c.

MONDAY, May 31.

The following is an extract of a mes-
sage, this day received from the Presi-
dent of the United States, by Mr. Gra-
ham:

To the Senate of the United States.

Commissions having been granted, dur-
ing the recess of the Senate, to the fol-
lowing persons, I now nominate them to
the same offices respectively annexed to
their names: Albert Gallatin, John Q.
Adams and James A. Bayard, to be joint-
ly and severally envoys extraordinary &
ministers plenipotentiary to negotiate
and sign a treaty of peace with G. Bri-
tain, under the mediation of the emperor
of Russia; to negotiate and sign a treaty
of commerce with Great Britain; and the
said John Quincy Adams, Albert
Gallatin & James A. Bayard, to be joint-
ly and severally envoys extraordinary &
ministers plenipotentiary, to negotiate
and sign a treaty of commerce with Rus-
sia.

Washington, May 29.

The message was read.
Ordered, That it lie for consideration.

WEDNESDAY, June 2.

The Senate resumed the consideration
of the message of the President of the
United States of the 31st May, nominat-
ing Albert Gallatin and others to offices;
and

Mr. King submitted the following motions
for consideration, which were read:
1. Resolved, That the President of the
U. States be requested to cause to be laid
before the Senate, copies of the commu-
nications from the emperor of Russia, of-
fering his mediation to bring about a
peace between the U. States & G. Britain,
together with copies of the answers to
such communications; and noticing the
dates at which the same were respectively
received and answered.

2. Resolved, That the President of
the United States be requested to cause
to be laid before the Senate, copies of
the commissions to Albert Gallatin, John
Quincy Adams and James A. Bayard, to
negotiate treaties of peace and com-
merce with Great Britain, and a treaty of
commerce with Russia.

3. Resolved, That the President of
the United States be requested to inform
the Senate whether Albert Gallatin, com-
missioned as one of the envoys to treat
of peace and commerce with Great Bri-
tain, and of commerce with Russia, re-
tains the office of Secretary of the De-
partment of the Treasury; and in case
of his retaining the same, to inform the
Senate under what authority, and by
whom, the power and duties of the head
of the Treasury Department are dis-
charged, during the absence of Albert
Gallatin from the United States.

THURSDAY, June 3.

The Senate proceeded to consider the
first resolution submitted yesterday,
by Mr. King; and

On the question, will the Senate agree
thereto?

It was determined in the negative.

The Senate proceeded to the consid-
eration of the third resolution, submitted
yesterday by Mr. King.

On the question, will the Senate agree
thereto?

It was determined in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Secretary lay the
said resolution before the President of
the United States.

MONDAY, June 7th, 1813.

The following written message was
received from the President of the Uni-
ted States by Mr. Graham:

To the Senate of the United States.

In compliance with their resolution
of the 3d instant, the Senate are inform-
ed, that the office of the Secretary of the
Treasury is not vacated; and that in the
absence of Albert Gallatin, commissioned
as one of the envoys to treat with
Great Britain and Russia, the duties of
that office are discharged by William
Jones, Secretary of the Navy, author-
ized therefor according to the provisions
of the act of Congress, entitled "An act
making alterations in the Treasury and
War Departments," passed May 8th,
1792.

Washington, June 3d, 1813.

The message was read for considera-
tion.

The Senate resumed the considera-
tion of the nomination of Albert Galla-
tin; and

On motion, by Mr. Gilman,
It was agreed to take the question (to
advise and consent) by yeas and nays.

On motion,
Ordered, That the further considera-
tion of the nomination be postponed un-
til to-morrow.

TUESDAY, June 8th, 1813.

The Senate resumed the considera-
tion of the nomination of Albert Galla-
tin; and

On motion, by Mr. Bledsoe,
That the further consideration of the
nomination be postponed until to-mor-
row; and

It was agreed that the Senate adjourn.

WEDNESDAY, June 9th, 1813.

The Senate resumed the considera-
tion of the nomination of Albert Galla-
tin.

Whereupon,
A motion was made, by Mr. Ander-
son,

To refer the said nomination to the
consideration of a select committee, to-
gether with the message of the 7th June;
and

After debate,
The Senate adjourned.

THURSDAY, June 10th, 1813.

tin, together with the motion to refer the
consideration thereof to a select com-
mittee; as also the message of the Presi-
dent of the United States, received the
7th June, to inquire and report thereon:

So it was
Resolved, That the nomination of Al-
bert Gallatin, together with the message
of the President of the United States re-
ceived the 7th instant, relative to the said
nomination, be referred to Mr. Ander-
son, Mr. King, Mr. Giles, Mr. Brown,
and Mr. Bledsoe, to inquire and report
thereon.

MONDAY, June 14.

Mr. Anderson from the committee
appointed the 10th instant, on the nomi-
nation of Albert Gallatin, reported:

"That in obedience to the resolution
authorising the committee to inquire &
report thereon, he had addressed a let-
ter to the President of the United States
enclosing a copy of the resolution un-
der which the committee were appoint-
ed; that he afterwards called on the
President of the United States, who in-
formed him, that he did not consider
the authority given to the committee,
by the resolution, such as to authorise
them to call on him in their official char-
acter; but, that if they were especially
instructed to call upon him, he would
freely receive them, and appoint a time
for that purpose;" and

Mr. Anderson submitted the follow-
ing resolutions for consideration, which
were read:

Resolved, That in the opinion of the
senate, the powers and duties of the se-
cretary of the department of the treasu-
ry, and of those of an envoy extraordi-
nary to a foreign power, are so incom-
patible, that they ought not to be, and
remain, united in the same person.

Resolved, That the committee to
whom was referred the nomination of
Albert Gallatin, (secretary of the de-

partment of treasury) as an envoy ex-
traordinary to treat of peace and com-
merce with Great Britain, and of com-
merce with Russia, be instructed to
communicate the foregoing resolution
to the President of the United States,
and respectfully to confer with him up-
on the matter thereof.

TUESDAY, June 15.

Mr. Anderson; and

On motion, by Mr. Robinson,

It was agreed that the question be ta-
ken thereon by yeas and nays; and after
debate adjourned.

nicate the foregoing resolution to the Pre-
sident of the United States, and respect-
fully to confer with him upon the mat-
ter thereof.

MONDAY, July 19.

On motion, by Mr. Anderson,
It was agreed by unanimous consent
to amend the record of the verbal re-
port made by him in behalf of the com-
mittee, on the 14th June last, as fol-
lows:

In the 4th line of the report of the
committee on the nomination of Albert
Gallatin, after the word "States," in-
sert, "a copy of which accompanies this
report."—Line 12, after "him," insert
"and the specific object should be desig-
nated."—Line 15, after the word "con-
sideration," insert "as chairman of the
committee," so that the record of the
report will stand amended as follows:

appointed on the 10th instant, on the
nomination of Albert Gallatin, reported:

"That in obedience to the resolution
authorising the committee to inquire &
report thereon, he had addressed a let-
ter to the President of the United States,
a copy of which accompanies this report,
enclosing a copy of the resolution un-
der which the committee were appoint-
ed; that he afterwards called on the
President of the United States, who in-
formed him that he did not consider the
authority given to the committee by the
resolution, such as to authorise them to
call on him in his official character; but,
that if they were especially instructed to
call on him, and the specific object should
be designated, he would freely receive
them; and appoint a time for that pur-
pose."

Copy of a letter from the Chairman of
the Committee on the nomination of
Albert Gallatin, to the President of
the United States.
Capitol Hill, 11th June, 1813.

SIR,

I take leave to enclose you a copy
of a resolution of the senate. The com-
mittee appointed by that resolution have
directed me to inform you that they
will wait on you at such time as you
may please to appoint, in order to com-
mune with you upon the matter refer-
red to them.

Accept assurances

JOSEPH ANDERSON.

Mr. Anderson then made this fur-
ther report, to wit:

The committee to whom was re-

ferred the nomination of Albert Galla-
tin, to be one of the envoys extra-
ordinary and ministers plenipotenti-
ary to negotiate and sign a treaty of
peace with Great Britain under the
mediation of the Emperor of Russia;
to negotiate and sign a treaty of
commerce with Great Britain; and
to negotiate and sign a treaty of
commerce with Russia, together
with the message of the President of
the United States, of the 7th June,
report:

"That according to the instruc-
tions of the Senate of the 16th June,
the committee, through its chairman,
addressed a note to the President of
the United States, on the 12th inst.,
a copy of which accompanies this re-
port, and in reply thereto, the Pre-
sident addressed a note to the chair-
man on the 14th instant, which note
also accompanies this report, ap-
pointing Friday, the 16th instant,
to receive the committee to com-
municate the aforesaid resolution of
the Senate, and apprising the com-
mittee of his late message to the Sen-
ate, containing the grounds on
which he would be obliged to decline
the proposed conference with the
committee. Upon due considera-
tion of this reply, the committee
deemed it an incumbent duty to wait
on the President according to his ap-
pointment, and to present to him
both the resolutions of the Senate in
relation to the nomination referred
to the committee, and did accord-
ingly wait on him and present them.
When the President was pleased to
observe to the committee, in sub-
stance, that he was sorry that the
Senate had not taken the same view
of the subject which he had done,
and that he regretted that the mea-
sure had been taken under circum-
stances which deprived him of the
aid or advice of the Senate. After
the committee had remained a rea-
sonable time for the President to
make any other observations if he
thought proper to do so, and observ-
ing no disposition manifested by him
to enter into further remarks, the
committee retired without making
any observations on the matter of
the resolutions, or in reply to those
made by the President.

Copy of a letter from the Chairman of
the Committee on the nomination of Al-
bert Gallatin, to the President of the
U. States.
July 12th, 1813.

SIR,

The committee to whom was
referred the nomination of Albert
Gallatin, to be one of the envoys ex-
traordinary and ministers plenipoten-
tiary, to negotiate and sign a treaty
of peace with Great Britain, under
the mediation of the Emperor of
Russia; to negotiate and sign a
treaty of commerce with Great Bri-
tain; and to negotiate and sign a
treaty of commerce with Russia;
together with the message of the
President of the 7th of June, have
directed me to enclose to you a co-
py of two resolutions, passed by the
Senate, and to request that you will
be pleased to appoint such time to re-
ceive the committee as may entire-
ly comport with your own conveni-
ence.

The committee sincerely lament,
that your indisposition for some time
past has been such as would have
rendered it improper to have ad-
dressed you upon this subject at an
earlier period; and are now much
gratified to learn, that you are again so
far restored to your health as to be
enabled to attend to your official du-
ties.

Accept my best wishes for a per-
fect restoration of your health, and
assurance of my high respect.

to Mr. Anderson, and informs him
that he will on Friday next, at 11
o'clock, receive the committee of
the Senate instructed to commu-
nicate to the President their resolu-
tion of the 16th ultimo. The com-
mittee are apprised, by his late mes-
sage to the Senate, of the grounds
on which he will be obliged to de-
cline the proposed conference with
the committee upon the matter of
that resolution.

Wednesday, July 14th, 1813,

Whereupon,

The nominations of Albert Galla-
tin, John Quincy Adams, and James
A. Bayard, agreeably to the message
of the President of the United States
of the 31st May last, were resumed;
On the question, will the Senate
advise and consent to the appoint-
ment of Albert Gallatin?

It was determined in the negative,
yeas 17, nays 18.
