A Col. BAKER, in command of an expedition against the Blackfoot Indians near Fort Benton, M. T., on January 21st, surprised the camp of Bear Chief, consisting of 30 lodges, killing all but eight bucks. Bear, who is known to have murdered many whites, is among the slain. Some of the Grosventres, Bloods and Piegans, hearing of the fate of Bear's camp, fled across into the British possessions, but the Colonel obtained permission to follow them, and was still in pursuit. The Blackfeet have been, and still are, a very troublesome and treacherous tribe, and require the constant presence of soldiers to keep them peaceable. But in this instance Col. Baker and his soldier boys have made good Indians of Bear and his party. The Pintees, Snakes and Bannacks of this region are equally treacherous and blood thirsty with the Blackfeet. The lesson of the withdrawal of troops from the upper Missouri, is certain to be repeated here, in case our frontier posts shall be abandoned as is now proposed.

Old Virginia has been admitted to her former status in the Union minus slavery; her Senators and Representatives sworn in and taken their seats, but not without much opposition from the Copperhead side of the house. Wood, the ardent old hypocrite, objected to having Congressmen sworn in because some years ago Porter, in a heated debate in Norfolk, had declared the Government a humbug. Sargent, of California, replied that if all members were expelled who could be convicted of having used such language, the seats on the Democratic side would be pretty generally vacant; whereupon Woodward, of Pennsylvania, blustered and spluttered awhile and pronounced Sargent's remarks slanderous to the Democracy.

The Democratic papers will probably cease now to charge the Radicals with keeping States out of the Union, as when one comes to the door clothed and in her right mind, they still persist in trying to keep her out in the cold.

Ex U. S. Senator, James S. Green of Missouri, died in St. Louis on the 19th of January, aged 53 years. Green, during his Senatorial career, was regarded by many as the ablest debater on the Democratic side, but falling under habits of dissipation, which had grown upon him for many years, he became a wreck of his former self, and during the war allied what there was left of him to the rebel cause, which sank him lower than ever, so that at the time of his death he exhibited none of the fire and vigor of his earlier life and died in circumstances of extreme poverty.

The last act of bravery committed by the Vigilantes in Montana was to hang a Chinaman on a tree in Dry Gulch at Helena, and pin upon his back a card with the words, "Beware of Vigilantes; still alive."

J. W. GASHWILER has been discharged from his debts by operation of law, and begins the world anew. "Cash" is liable to be worth \$100,000 before the end of the year.

Opposition to Division.

TUESDAY, Jan. 25th, 1870. At an adjourned meeting of the citizens of Boise City, called to consider the best means to protest against the division of the Territory, Mr. Heed, the chairman, being absent, W. A. Flourmoy was called to the chair.

The committee on resolutions, by their chairman, Mr. Geer, offered the following

PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTIONS: WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States has under consideration the division of our Territory by annexing a certain portion lying south of Snake river to the State of Nevada: and

WHEREAS, Said portion of Idaho Territory embraces our richest mines and a large agricultural district which lies contiguous to and naturally gravitates towards such river and Boise valley, and is inseparably connected to Southern Idaho: and

WHEREAS, No such division could be made in justice to that portion of the people so cut off or do justice to those remaining north of said division. Be it therefore

Resolved, That we respectfully protest against such division, or any division tending to dismember our Territory.

Resolved, That it is not only repugnant to republican principle to destroy the established geographical lines of our common country without the consent and against the wishes of those most interested, but it is a violation of public honor by so segregating Idaho Territory as to diminish the security of her creditors.

Resolved, That recognizing Congress not only as the guardian, but as the protector of the common interests of all American citizens, we earnestly appeal to that body for the security of our rights, confidently believing that august tribunal to be actuated by the highest motives of pure patriotism.

Resolved, That any division of Snake river valley is unnatural, impolitic, and seriously detrimental to the interests of the people of said valley, and without corresponding benefit to the State of Nevada.

Resolved, That our Delegate in Congress, the Hon. J. K. Shafer, be requested to lay these Resolutions before Congress with such other information as he may be able to give, in order that such proposed division may never be made, or any division detrimental to the interests of Idaho Territory.

Signed, J. C. GEER, R. E. FOOTE, MILTON KELLY, COM.

The question being on the adoption of the resolutions they were unanimously adopted.
