## Vardaman at Lexington.

Major J. K. Vardaman filled his engagement at Lexington Tuesday, as per previous announcement. He was accorded a most respectful hearing by a crowd, estimated by his adherents at about 1500 people, a large proportion being visitors from outside of the county.

The "Madison County Vardaman Club" had a special train here, and delegations of "faithful" were in evidence from Attala, Carroll, LeFlore, Montgomery, Madison, Hinds, Yazoo and other counties. None of the spectacular features "threatened" such as 25 yokes of oxen meeting him at the train, took place. Everything was conducted with absolute decorum. The major was carried from the depot to the Arlington Hotel in an automobile, and more automobiles than ox yokes were in evidence. He began his address at the hour appointed, after a graceful introduction by B. S. Beall, one of the best, most highly respected and substantial citizens of Holmes county, and occupied the usual time required by his set speech. He was applauded during his address, but the applause seemed rather perfunctory than heartfelt. His remarks were about the same as Holmes county citizens have heard him deliver at various times during the past two decades. It is safe to assert that he made no converts to his cause, and if he held his ranks intact he did well.
