POULTRY CORNER

The following are methods recommended by the Department of Agriculture:
Water Glass Method—For 30 dozen eggs—use two five-gallon crocks (capacity, 15 dozen eggs each). Take 18 quarts of water that has been boiled and cooled. Mix with it two quarts of sodium silicate. Place eggs as collected, fresh and clean, in crocks, keeping covered to a depth of at least two inches with water glass solution. Keep in a cool, dry place. Eggs preserved in this way remain perfectly wholesome, maintain full food value and are perfectly edible for from value and are perfectly edible for from

six to nine months.

Lime Water Method—Place three pounds of unslaked lime in five gallons of water and let it stand until the lime settles and the liquid is clear. Use the same as water glass.

This method is recommended when water glass cannot be obtained; it is good, though not quite as reliable as the other.

There are nine essential features for

There are nine essential features for profitable poultry keeping. Of these, thus far we have discussed keeping better poultry, selecting vigorous breeders, hatch the chicks early.

Our breeders have been selected and the hatching season is over and closed, except for a few late fryers.

We come now to preserve eggs for home use. Every home should be supplied with eggs in water glass. Properly handled, they will be as good as storage eggs, a year after having been put up. The expense is small. Eggs are much cheaper now than they were in January of this year, but are higher than a year ago. All indications are that they will be higher next winter than last. So it behooves us to provide for our own use now and sell high priced eggs next winnow and sell high priced eggs next win-

Having hatched our eggs and counted our chicks, we must exert all care to keep them growing. Too much attention cannot be given to details.

Keep free of lice, mites and chiggers. As May is the worst month for these, the older chicks have a better start.

Nothing is better than buttermilk added to the regular feed.

Avoid heavy dews by keeping the old hen penned.
