Sister Nivedita to Establish a Modern School in Calcutta.

Came to This Country to Prieure Wives at Fourteen Years of Age.

will leave New York today on the steamer Paris to return to Incia. Sister Nivemonths ago to obtain financial support for the Ramakrishna School for Girls, which she proposes to establish in Calcutta. She has succeeded in a measure in accomplishing the object of her mission to this country. Speaking of her plans, and of some of the social conditions in India, Sister Nivedita said:

'It is wholly a mistake to suppose that I have renounced either my nationality or my religion in becoming a sister of the rder. Christianity is the nursery in which my spiritual thought was trained. In acquiring the larger lessons of life that ome when the world opens to us, we do not renounce the valuable teachings of the cursery. The distinguished doctrine of Hindooism is that the phenomenal universe that appears to us as many is really one, infinite, eternal, unchangeable. When we perceive the one as many we are in a state of illusion. When we see the many as one we have apprehended the real. The Hindoo prays, not for "daily bread," but that he may be led from the unreal to the
